If the test is suc-cessful, all Harvard dining halls will follow the same course. The waiters will be hired by Super-intendent R. L. Westcott from candi-dates selected by W. W. Daly, who is in charge of student employment. The men will be paid \$9 in cash for working there days a week from 6.30 to 8.55 II.30 to 1.55 and 5 to 7.30. The new system, it is believed, should strengthen materially the spirit of companionship which is fostered by having all new men eat logether in the freshman halls.
