B. Peat, who was húrrying in his Hudson sedan to the Evangeline Maternity Hospital.

Richard Walsh, 109 Hilyard street, driver of the Overland touring car, was badly cut about the head and face, a piece having been almost completely severed from the back of his scalp. John Conway, another occupant of the car, was cut about the face. These two men were discharged from the hospital soon after their wounds were treated, but Mr. Walsh was still in bed last evening suffering from his injuries. William McCann and John Shields, the other two men in the Walsh car, escaped unhurt.

Both automobiles were badly damaged, the windshield, back window, bumper, radiator and other portions of the front of Dr. Peat's car being smashed and the left front wheel, running board, radiator and other sections of the Walsh car being crumpled up.

A resident of Douglas avenue took the doctor to the Evangeline Home in his car. Both the wrecked vehicles were removed by a local service station.


Tells Political Opponents to Wait and See; Blames Conservatives
