SELLING CURRENT IN LANCASTER PARISH Power Company's Protest

Referred to Mayor and City Solicitor

OBJECTS TO CITY'S

The City Council yesterday received from the New Brunswick Power Com-pany a complaint that the Civic Pow-er Commission were selling current in the Parish of Lancaster, contrary to law. The counsel referred the matter to the Mayor and city solicitor. The council also accepted the bid of B. Mooney and Sons for paving blocks for St. James street, authorized the laying of a cast fron water pipe on west side and allowed in part the appeal of the McLaughlin Motor Car Co. Ltd. against its assessment. The New Brunswick Power Com-



The New Brunswick Power Com-pany wrote asking that the council take action on a protest which they had made to the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission and the Civic Pow-er Commission on the action of the lat-ter in selling current to residents of the Parish of Lancaster, contrary to the law

Commissioner Harding said the Civic Power Commission, of which he was a member, had not given any orders to have services installed in Lancaster but he understood it had been done. On the suggestion of the Mayor the matter was referred to himself and the city solicitor for a report.


