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

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the act which attracts box office receipts, he argued, and the transportation of properties in interstate commerce merely is incidental. He said that the Supreme Court had held that the uniform, bats and other paraphernalia carried by professional baseball teams did not constitute interstate commerce.

Supreme Court decision as construed by counsel for Hart, however, laid down the principle that interstate commerce consists of the transfer across state lines of some product of human effort. The production of vaudeville essentially entailed a product of human labor, it was argued, as well as a commodity in which the property rights of the owners were recognized and protected by law.

From the producer's standpoint, Hart's counsel contended, there could be no doubt that the act and not the performers was the attraction. The producer created the act, employed the performers, furnished the scenery, completely staged the act, and sometimes had to employ special transportation facilities to move it in interstate commerce.

WHY NOT REVIVE ARBOR DAY?

What has become of the old-fashioned Arbor Day in Ontario? Years ago Arbor Day was quite an event in most of the schools, when trees were set out and teachers and others emphasized the need of tree-planting. There was never a time in Ontario's history when

HAMMER MURDERESS MUST GO TO PRISON.

Los Angeles, Cal., June 1—Clara Phillips, hammer murderess, lost her last legal fight against being taken to San Quentin Penitentiary late today when Justice Nathaniel H. Conroy denied a motion for a writ of habeas corpus to have her taken to the county jail here in the jurisdiction of that court.

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DOES THE ACTOR OR THE ACT DRAW THE AUDIENCES?

Contention Both Ways in a Case Brought Against Theatrical Organizations.

Washington, June 1—Whether it is the act, or the actor alone, which attracts vaudeville-goers is a question the Supreme Court is asked to answer in a case brought by Max Hart against the B. F. Keith Vaudeville Exchange, the Orpheum Circuit, Inc., the Excelsior Collection Agency, Inc., and others.

Hart charged that there is a vast vaudeville monopoly directed by the Keith Exchange east of Chicago and by the Orpheum Circuit in the west, which by blacklisting has made it impossible for any author, producer, or actor to show on the first class vaudeville circuits without booking with them and subscribing to their regulations. The combination is so strong, he asserted, that the owners of theatres are unable to run independently.

Alleging that the Keith Exchange and others named were engaged in interstate commerce because the contracts they make contemplate interstate transportation of the act, Hart asked the Federal District Court in New York City to declare the arrangement an unlawful combination under the Sherman law. To support his allegation he asserted that the performers carried with them needed stage properties, and that it was the act on a whole, or a combination of the property shipped in interstate commerce, plus the actor, which attracted patronage and constituted the business transacted.

District Judge Mack dismissed the complaint on the ground that it did not present a controversy over which a Federal Court has jurisdiction. The business affected, he held, was not interstate commerce, but the personal service of the performers.

He asserted, as defined by Senator Pepper of Pennsylvania, who was counsel for the defendants, consists of an entertainment for hire upon the stage of a theatre where the spectator witnessed "a number of dissociated, short performances." It is the artist and not

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
