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THE VISITING JOURNALISTS.

All who met the visiting journalists and their party on Saturday were impressed by their appearance, their high spirits, and their evident interest in everything around them. They were a fine body of men and women, truly Canadian in spirit and of an engaging mind. Their president, Mr. A. R. Brennan, a Maritime Province man, founded a lofty note of patriotism in his brief address at the luncheon, and the response was universal. Being an eastern man, he was naturally gratified by the warmth of the welcome extended by the people in Fredericton and St. John, and it is to the credit of Mayor Fisher and Council and the citizens' committee that they did their part well. It was impossible in an afternoon to show the visitors all they would have liked to see, and the fact that it was a half holiday in the city added to the difficulty. The gentlemen of the party were shown the dry dock, however, and the ladies were delightedly entertained at the home of Mayor and Mrs. Fisher, while the evening entertainment was very enjoyable. At the luncheon, where all were gathered together, Rev. Mr. Fleming, in a very appropriate and bright address, touched the chief features of St. John's history, and as a man who had come here from Toronto two years ago he could speak of the impressions the city and its climate and people had upon one from outside the bounds of these eastern provinces. Mr. R. E. Armstrong in a few words set clearly before the visitors the value of this national port to Canada, and its needs in the matter of facilities for handling Canadian traffic. The particular value of the port to the country in war-time was properly emphasized, as well as the reception tendered the western battalions who sailed from this port. A TRAGEDY AND A VERDICT.

There is a phrase in the verdict of the coroner's jury concerning the tragic death of Mr. A. L. Law which is worthy of note. The jury exonerated the motorman "considering the equipment at his command." The attention of the New Brunswick Power Company will no doubt be attracted by this pronouncement. It was also brought out that the motorman had but seven days training and no previous experience before taking charge of a one-man car. It is true he had much actual experience since then, but it is seven days training sufficient? Still another interesting fact was brought out. It was learned that a police officer was rather hazy in his knowledge of the legal rate of speed for a vehicle in the street. Every officer ought not only to have thorough knowledge but to be always on the alert. We have no such congestion of traffic as they have in larger cities, but there are many times when pedestrians and the occupants of cars are endangered. Anything that conduces to carelessness of habit on the part of motorman or chauffeur means greater danger to the public. The late Mr. Law undoubtedly did wrong in attempting to cross the street where he did and in not watching both ways. Pedestrians must get the habit of using street corner crossings and watching carefully as they cross, but even that is not always an assurance of safety. The tragedy of last week is a lesson and warning, but not to pedestrians alone. Drivers of vehicles must exercise the greatest care. Street cars should not pass each other at too rapid a pace. The police should make a quick example of every motorist violating the regulations. Public opinion will approve of a rigid enforcement. An enquiring eye should be kept upon the persons driving cars, as to their age and competence. The public must be protected. As to street cars, remembering that they are one-man cars, that phrase "considering the equipment at his command," is worthy of the attention of the Power Company.

MAJESTIC BEATS RECORD.

London, May 26—(Associated Press.)—The Majestic made a record run recently up the Channel between Casquets and Cherbourg, traveling at one time at 29.7 knots an hour. The engines developed a speed of more than 25.5 knots and, with the tide running in her favor at between four and five knots, the liner was able to accomplish a performance no other liner has ever equaled. On a recent trip from New York the liner also beat her own previous record for a day's run, doing 608 miles in twenty-three hours.

Practical Pointers Concerning Wireless in All Its Branches.

Wire for Tuning-Coil.

A half a pound of wire is required when making a tuning-coil for a crystal set. The wire, double-cotton-covered, can be any number from No. 22 to No. 28.

The Best Conductors.

Under ordinary conditions, metals are the best conductors of electricity. Among them, silver is the best, copper next, then gold, aluminum, zinc, tin and nickel.

Repaired Vacuum Tubes.

Vacuum tubes can be repaired, but unless the work is carried out expertly and carefully the results will be almost certain to be far less satisfactory than when new.

When Using Loop Antenna.

The loop antenna should be carefully tuned, and before successful reception can be expected, it must be experimentally adjusted. The number of turns of wire on the loop are what really tune the set, too many turns giving too high a wave length and not enough turns giving too low a wave length.

Cause of Sound Distortion.

Distortion of sounds from a radio receiving set is sometimes caused when many steps of amplification are used and not sufficient amount of high plate voltage employed on the last tube or tubes. The remedy is to use power tubes in the last stages.

Closing Session Of Methodist Conference

The final meeting of the ministerial conference of the Methodist church of N. B. and P. E. I., at Sackville, was held on Saturday and reports were received from various committees. Rev. R. C. Fulton reported for the business committee. Rev. Charles Fleming reported for the sustentation fund reported \$2,281.28 received.

Grants to St. John District were recommended as follows: Silver Falls, \$155; Apohaqui, \$226.

The Board of Examiners was constituted as follows: Rev. F. A. Weightman, South Devon, chairman; Rev. H. E. Thomson, secretary, St. John; Rev. Dr. Watson, Sackville; Rev. J. M. Rice, St. John; Rev. S. Howard, Murray Harbor; Rev. H. S. Young, Jacksonville; Rev. George Morris, Summerside; Rev. J. J. Pinkerton, Marysville; Rev. H. C. Rice, Bathurst; and Rev. G. A. Ross, Hampton.

The third Tuesday in April was set for the holding of examinations.

The educational committee reported through its secretary, Rev. E. Thomson, the report called attention to the fact that thirty-five per cent. of the givings in the Maritime Provinces went direct to Mount Allison University.

The following probationers were recommended to be sent to college: M. S. Linton, R. H. Barker, R. Dawson, George Redman, J. W. Hughes, A. Habertin and C. Wright.

The statistics committee reported that 786 had been received into the church and the present membership was 16,841; the total amount raised for all purposes was \$355,440.97.

An interesting event took place on Saturday evening when a banquet was held by the Historical Society in the Ladies College. Two ministers who have completed forty years in the ministry were honored by the presentation of framed addresses.

Revs. William Penna, of Moncton, and William Lawrence, of St. John, have each served half a century and the addresses paid fitting tribute to their character and services.

Executive officers of the society were appointed as follows: Rev. E. A. Weightman, chairman; Rev. H. E. Thomson, secretary; J. M. Kenyon, Henry Smith, Hon. Justice H. A. McKeown, J. J. Weddall, G. A. Henderson, G. W. F. Glendinning and Thomas Mooney.

THE PRESBYTERIANS AND CHURCH UNION.

Church Union has been approved by an overwhelming majority of the Presbyterian Assembly. And while there was a minority opposition of about one to three in the Assembly, the minority when taking the three churches into consideration would be more like one to ten. Politically speaking, a minority that can muster one vote is a grievous and should be the object of no numbering or measuring spiritual strength. The opposition, if it decides to maintain a separate existence, will prove a veritable Gideon's Band achieving great things for God. And the majority, like Jehoshaphat, may say, "Let us be faithful to the Lord, and their fruits will be known. If the minority would bear good fruit it will immediately purge itself of all that is evil. If the majority will say it is the will of God, and power, it will humble itself and be very magnanimous and tolerant, and consecrate its measure of unity, physical and spiritual, to the affairs of the Kingdom. Let both majority and minority factors remember that they have all that is really worthy to be known. In the season, the fruits of the spirit are obvious. It may be that it is the will of God that those who desire union may have it, and those who desire separation may have it. There can be no coercion outside of the compelling love of the will of God.
