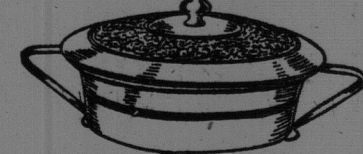
Canon Armstrong congratulated the guild on its work during the past year and on the large attendance at the meeting. A vote of thanks was extended to the rector for presiding.

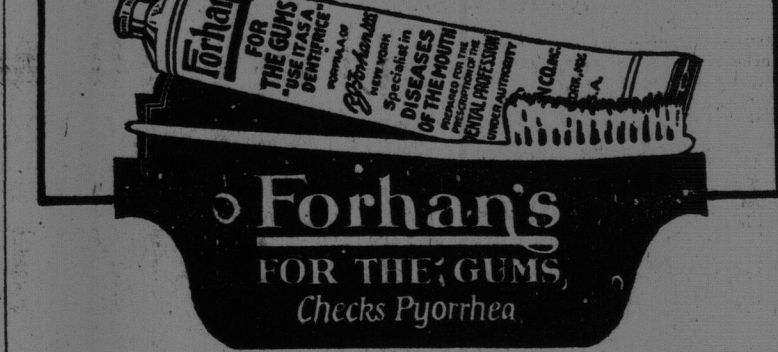
