BRITISH FOOD CHIEF ASKS AID

Says Central Nations Are
Crumbling — Sir William
Goode Declares Immediate
Assistance Is Needed to
Prevent Chaos.

Central Europe is on the verge of
crumbling, and the only remedy im-
mediately at hand is the early declara-
tion of peace, according to Sir William
Goode, British Director of Relief in
Austria, who recently outlined the situa-
tion at the American Luncheon Club
in London.

"Until peace is ratified Central Europe
will be a patchwork of ethnological dis-
location," the speaker is quoted in a re-
port in the Liverpool Daily Post and
Mercury. "An over-prolonged armis-
tice, following upon four years of war,
has knocked away almost every
damning political, financial and eco-
nomic. I only wish that those who are
delaying the ratification of peace
could visit Central Europe and see for
themselves the economic chaos and the
suffering which can be traced directly
to their own political actions."

"I think it must be apparent how-
ever, that the crisis in Central Europe
is of such dimensions and complexity
as to defy isolated or individual effort.
You cannot heal the wounds of Europe
by dribbles of Government relief or dabs
of humanity. A comprehensive and far-
reaching financial arrangement must be
quickly arrived at by the Allied and
Associated Governments unless half of
Central Europe is to be a desolate waste
of seedling thistles."

The key to the economic arch is or-
ganization of credits for food and raw
materials and the export of manufac-
tures on regular and ascending scale
from the countries receiving such credits.
With the pound sterling only worth
about \$4, and with the present position
of French and Italian exchange, it is
evident that any such comprehensive
credit scheme will be futile unless the
United States takes a generous part.
Great Britain has already borrowed, in
partnership with France and Italy, \$48,-
000,000 from the United States to feed
Austria.

Of one thing I am quite certain and
that is that if Central Europe and the
new nations are allowed to stew in their
own juices, the whole world will suffer.
In any case, whatever remedy may be
accepted, it will involve on both con-
tinent a demand for common sacrifice
and common stimulation of production.
I think I am authorized to say that
if the United States can see its way
to take part in some such comprehensive

The Board of Assessors of Taxes of the City of Saint John

HEREBY Require all persons liable to be rated for the year 1920
forthwith to furnish to the Assessors true statements of all their per-
sonal estate and income, which is assessable under "The St. John
City Assessment Act 1918," and true statements of wages or salaries
paid to employees, and hereby give notice that blank forms on which
such statements may be furnished may be obtained at the Office of the
Assessors, and that such statements must be perfected under oath
and filed in said office within thirty days from the date of this notice.

EXTRACTS FROM "THE SAINT JOHN CITY ASSESSMENT ACT 1918"

30. (1). Every person liable to taxation under this Act, shall
make the following returns:

(a). A return of his personal property located in the City of
St. John and taxable under section 5 of this Act.

(b). Income taxable under section 6, and the particulars there-
of, except when the total taxable income is included in the return of
an employer as provided in sub-section 2 of this section.

(c). Earnings or receipts taxable under section 8 and the par-
ticulars thereof.

(2). Every person employing the services or labor of another
person or of other persons shall make a statement giving the name
and address of every person employed by him and the amount of
wages, salaries, or other compensation paid to such employee or em-
ployees. Every firm, co-partnership, or corporation shall make a
statement of the salaries, allowances, or other compensation of part-
ners or officers.

(3). The return or statement required by this section shall be
made on or before the tenth day of February in each year, in such
form as the assessors shall from time to time prescribe, and shall be
made under oath which may be sworn to before any assessor, or any
Justice of the Peace of the City and County of Saint John, or any
Notary Public; and for the purposes of this Act, and of all other
laws relating to the levying, assessing and collecting of rates and
taxes in the City of Saint John, any assessor and any Justice of the
Peace of the City and County of Saint John, and any Notary Public,
shall have full power and lawful authority to take affidavits and
affirmations, and administer oaths, in any matter whatsoever relating
to rates, taxes and assessments in the City of Saint John.

32. If no return, or a fraudulent, incorrect or insufficient return,
has been filed by a person required to file a return under the provi-
sions of this Act, and the person so in default refuses or neglects,
after notice, to file a proper return, the assessors shall determine the
personal property or income of such person taxable under this Act,
according to their best information and belief, and shall assess the
same at double the amount so determined. In the case of sickness,
absence, or other disability of a person liable to the tax the assessors
may allow such further time for filing the return as they may deem
necessary.

33. If the assessors discover from the verification of a return
filed under this Act, or otherwise, that the income of any person sub-
ject to taxation under this Act, or any portion thereof, has not been
assessed, they may at any time within two years after the time when
such assessment should have been made, assess the same, first giving
notice to the person to be so assessed of their intention, and such
person shall thereupon have an opportunity within ten days after
such notification to confer with the assessors in person or by coun-
sel or by other representative as to the proposed assessment. After
the expiration of ten days from such notification the assessors shall
assess the income of such person subject to taxation, or any portion
thereof which they believe has not theretofore been assessed, and
they shall thereupon give notice thereof to the person so assessed, and
the tax shall be payable fourteen days after the date of such notice.
The provisions of this Act in respect to the collection of taxes shall
apply to a tax so assessed.

47. No person shall have an abatement unless he has filed with
the assessors the statement under oath within the time required; nor
shall the Common Council or the Board of Revision in any such case
sustain an appeal from the judgment of the assessors unless said
Common Council or Board of Revision shall be satisfied that there
was good cause why the statement was not filed in due time as herein
provided.
