GOOD FRIDAY IN CITY CHURCHES

Good Friday was observed in all the churches in the city yesterday. In the First Presbyterian church, West End, the pastor, Rev. Dr. J. A. Morison, spoke on the subject "What We Believe About the Death of Christ." Rev. R. Moorhead Legate, pastor of Knox Presbyterian church, preached from the text "The Watchers by the Cross" and "The Way of the Cross." The offering will be devoted to the Protestant orphan homes in the city.

In the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception the mass of the pre-sanctified was celebrated by His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc with Rev. M. P. Howland high priest, Rev. W. M. Duke deacon, Rev. S. Oram, sub-deacon and Rev. A. P. Allan master of ceremonies. In the afternoon the Way of the Cross was made and in the evening "Tenebrae" was chanted. Rev. Simon Oram delivered a sermon on the Passion of Our Lord. The usual Good Friday services were held in the other Catholic churches.

The services in the Main street Baptist church were conducted by the pastor, Rev. David Hutchinson, D.D., who took as his text "What will Thou have me to do?" Miss Durkee sang a solo during the service. In Trinity church the annual Passion music was given under the direction of the organist, J. S. Ford. Miss Louise Knight, Miss Audrey Mullin and F. R. Davis rendered solos. The tablet erected by the congregation of Trinity in memory of those who fell in the Great War will be unveiled at the Easter morning service by Lieut.-Colonel Alexander McMillan and Lieut.-Colonel W. H. Harrison. Members who served overseas will attend the service in uniform. Rev. Canon Armstrong, assisted by Rev. D. H. Loweth, conducted the service. The offertory was for the Jewish missions.

The story of the Passion was given in lantern slides from the famous French artists Tissot and Mestricam in St. Luke's church by the rector, Rev. R. P. McKim. Solos were rendered by Mrs. Walter Gregg and Willard A. Smith. Rev. R. S. Crisp assisted the pastor. Mr. F. P. Dawson, in the service in Exmouth street Methodist church. Mr. Dawson spoke on the crucifixion, Richard Dawson sang a solo. The priest in charge, Rev. Father J. V. Young, conducted the three hours' service in the Mission Church of St. John the Baptist. Our service was conducted in St. Jude's church, West St. John, yesterday by Rev. C. Gordon Lawrence of Hampton.

Brigadier Moore and Brigadier Barr conducted the services in No. 1 Salvation Army Citadel in Charlotte street. Commandant Shears, Ensign and Mrs. Laune, Adjutant Ursaki, Adjutant Best, Adjutant Lytell and Ensign Bray took

part in the services in No. 2 Citadel last evening.

In Centenary Methodist church Passions week has been observed since Monday by various services. On Monday evening the service was conducted by the young people of the Epworth League and the story of Christ's life was most vividly told. On Wednesday evening the day of silence, the service was conducted by Rev. H. A. Goodwin, the pastor, who gave an appropriate address. The service of the intercessors was held on Thursday evening. On Good Friday the regular services in keeping with the day were conducted by Rev. H. A. Goodwin, who told the story of the crucifixion. Mrs. C. F. 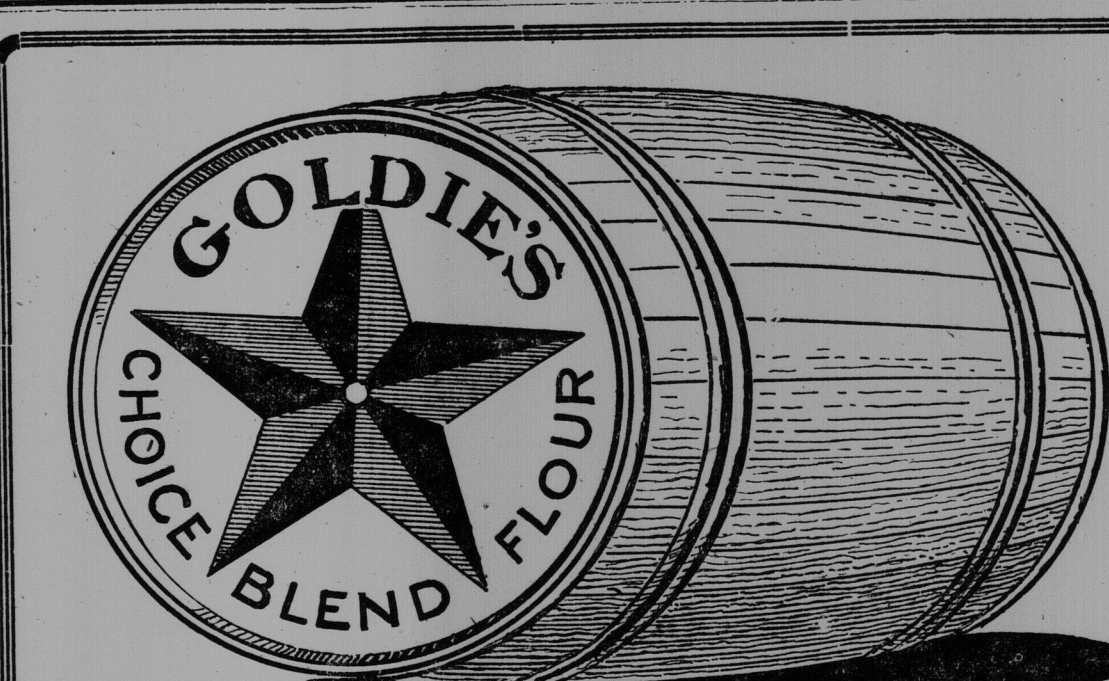
