Washington, July 29-Paper manufac-New York, July 80—An increase to the consumer of one cent a pound in the price of sugar is indicated in a statement issued here today by Chairman Rolph, of the International Sugar Committee, after a conference with representatives of the Cuban government. Sugar authorities of the Cuban and United States governments will meet in Washington next week to decide on the 1918 price.

Washington, July 29—Paper manufacturers today appealed to the federal trade commission for increased prices on newsprint as of May 1, June 1 and July 1. The American Newspaper Publishers' Association objected to a hearing, contending that the commission's functions as arbiter on paper prices were suspended pending a decision on the manufacturers' appeal from the \$8.10 a hundred weight prices fixed by the commission and effective last April 1.
