"Give Me Such Men As Canadians and I'll Go Anywhere"

This is Tribute of German Commander Captured at Passchendaele—Immortal Deeds of Dominion's Troops in France.

(By W. A. Willison.) Canadian Front, Dec. 31.—All over France and Flanders Canadians are being talked today in the sternest political contest in Canadian history.

Everywhere one goes in this battle-swept country there seem to be some record of Canadian valor. No village in the north from Amiens to the Salient is without a Canadian name.

"Give me such men as the Canadians and I will go anywhere," was the statement of a German commander captured at Passchendaele.

The title was merited for the story of Canada in action is nobly written throughout the long battle area from Scottish Wood, St. Julien and the old places that mark the historic record of the first desperate Canadian engagement.

To those who speak the spirit and intention of the resolutions of the German Reichstag of July 9 last, the spirit and intention of the liberal leaders and parties of Germany, or to those who resist and defy that spirit and intention and insist upon conquest and subjugation? Or are we listening, in fact, to both, unreconciled and in open and hopeless contradiction? These are very serious and pregnant questions. Upon the answer to them depends the peace of the world.

The countess was the recipient of many gifts from her imperial guest, and conspicuous among these, on the palace walls, was a large oil painting of the Kaiser, signed with his own august hand. Now comes the sequel. An enemy aviator, bent on one of those piratical raids upon Venice for which the Allies will hold the Central Powers to strict accountability, dropped a bomb on the center of the huge roof of the Palazzo da Mula. To the delight of the Venetians, the bomb passed through the imperial painting, and singling out the imperious painting, blew it to bits.
