LIBERALS ARE PLEASED OVER THE OUTLOOK

Naval Policy Means Defeat Of Borden at Next Election

BUSINESS OF COMMONS

Bill For Increase of Pay for Northwest Mounted Police—Debate on Matter of I.C.R. Dismissals—Bay Steamer Service and New Law

Ottawa, Dec. 6.—The Liberals will give the Borden naval policy a searching criticism. There was fully attended caucus of Liberal members and senators this morning. The caucus was called to consider the naval announcement made yesterday.

It is understood that a high note of patriotism and imperialism was struck, the members believing that the empire could best be strengthened by the creation of a Canadian naval policy which can be expanded in the full extent of the figures suggested in the memorandum and this they consider the true imperial policy.

As calm follows storm, so routine followed the naval announcement. Parliament today concerned itself with intimate domestic details. The members were too preoccupied to pay much attention to ordinary routine and left that to a corporal's guard on each side while the bulk of the members talked away in the corridors.

Both Liberal and Conservative members were strangely elated. The Conservatives feel that the prime minister did a big thing on Thursday which will keep them in power as long as they have the strength to wave a flag.

Liberals See Borden's Finish.
The Liberals are as pleased as possible with the situation and declare that the government's naval announcement has struck a blow at proper empire development which will spell the death of the Borden government in the next election. The lines on which the attack is to follow will be given by Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

When the house met in the afternoon Mr. Middlebrooke, chairman-elect of the public accounts committee, moved for the right to extend the operations of his investigation back beyond the year 1911-12, to which it is restricted by the existing rule of the house. At Premier Borden's request the motion stood over for further discussion.

Premier Borden introduced his motion proceeding the government bill to increase the pay of the men of the Northwest Mounted Police by 25 cents per day, and make provision for the creation of scouts and detectives in connection to the force.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier spoke briefly. He viewed with hearty approval the proposal to increase the pay of the men. "The Northwest Mounted Police," said the Liberal leader, "is a splendid body of men which deserves well of our country." He asked if it was the intention to increase the number of the police and suggested that the premier submit to the house the full enrollment of those who were to benefit by his bill. This Mr. Borden promised to do.

Hon. Mr. Cochrane's bill to enable former employees of the Intercolonial and Prince Edward Island railways, who had been dismissed on the grounds of political partisanship, to draw out their contributions to the provident fund, opened up a vigorous debate on the question of dismissal.

Messrs. MacDonald, Sinclair and Chisholm (Antigonish) led the attack and severely arraigned the conduct and course of H. P. Ducharme, the executioner appointed by the government to "try" the bill, and dismiss the men. Mr. MacDonald charged that Ducharme had gone so far as to use letters which had been stolen from the houses of those concerned, a charge which met with no defence from the government benches.

Wireless Equipment on Canadian Steamers.
A resolution providing that passenger ships shall have wireless, was passed after some discussion and a bill introduced which will probably be considerably amended on its second reading.

The bill provides that vessels of Canadian register licensed to carry fifty or more passengers and making voyages of 20 miles or more, shall carry wireless equipment under penalty of \$5,000 for the vessel and \$100 for the master.

Mr. Pardee asked why the minimum was fixed at fifty passengers. He thought that the safety of fewer passengers might be considered.

Mr. Hazen said that it was worth consideration and if desirable a change could be made on the second reading.

Mr. Pardee wanted to know if the bill would apply to vessels on the great lakes, and when the minister said that it would, Mr. Pardee suggested that as distances between ports were shorter there than on the ocean, the government should consider reducing the length of voyage to 100 miles or less.


