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A LITTLE FUN AT WESTMINSTER

O monstrous! but one half-penny-worth of bread to this intolerable deal of sack!

If the Germans are about to invade Britain, if a general European war is at hand, if the British government is in despair because of the action of Canada's Senate, if the Asquith administration is about to topple over, if Sir Edward Carson and his lieutenants are about to take to the trenches in Ulster—and recent cablegrams of Tory origin have assured us that all of these things are coming—how are we to account for the light-heartedness and the display of humor in the British House of Commons last night?

Perhaps here in Canada, where a certain school of alarmists is busily painting the sky with the lurid colors of coming strife and disaster, it may be well for us to observe how lightly these predicted catastrophes rest upon the honorable and right honorable gentlemen in the Imperial House of Commons.

The West Side has a building boom such as it has not experienced for a generation, and in other parts of the city more dwellings and stores are being erected than at any time within thirty years.

The Times publishes today a London cable letter on the financial situation. It tends to recall a phrase of the late J. Pierpont Morgan which became famous during another period of "full of undigested securities."

When Charles W. Morse left the federal prison at Atlanta, the doctors said he did not have a year to live. He now has an office in the Wall Street district and is at the head of an \$8,000,000 corporation. Liberty appears to have worked a miraculous improvement in the financier's health. The world will hope that Mr. Morse may live long—and that his financial methods will be more healthful than they were before his physique broke down.

Discussion of the plan for a "shopping week" shows that it has strong elements of popularity and utility. With good preliminary organization it could be made a great success and of large benefit to the city. St. John is always worth seeing, and particularly so this year. It should be possible to arrange short trips around the city and suburbs in order that visitors may see for themselves the progress St. John is making.

At the peace meeting in Ottawa Mr. Borden said: "Let us hope that so long as the waters of the St. Lawrence flow we shall be at peace with each other."

"Whatever may be the fate of the general movement among the nations in favor of peace, those whose mother tongue is English will never again take up arms against one another." That is the way to talk. If the English-speaking peoples act on this understanding they will never have much trouble with the rest of the world, because the English-speaking peoples standing together would be too formidable to invite aggression or injustice.

The city is to have a new official. He is to have charge of King Square and the old Loyalist burial ground. It would be well to provide the gentleman with a distinctive uniform, and to clothe him also, with authority sufficient to preserve order and decorum. It will be necessary for him to be on duty for twenty-four hours every day, and he should weigh about 225 pounds when in condition, and be able to stop a dog fight, pacify a hysterical woman, stop the children from crying, replace any nursemaid who desires to leave the baby for an hour or so, and be ready to whip his weight in wild cats when any intoxicated citizen tries to alter the appearance of the scenery. There should be no trouble in securing a man good enough for a job like this, there are so many people in town who know just how these things ought to be done.

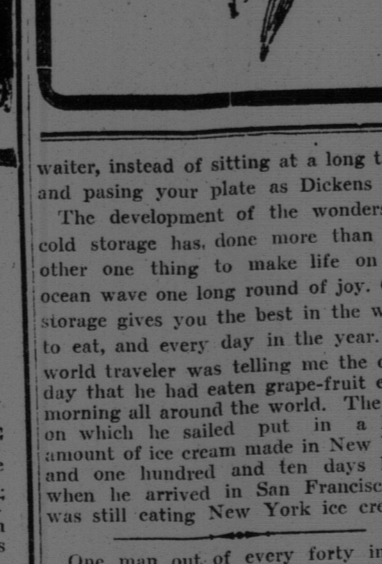

Planting factories have become an important part of the development of the forest resources of India. In certain parts the forests are only accessible through the watercourses, and the great expense of erecting land plants for the utilization of the lumber resource makes such a course impracticable.

Therefore sawmills and other manufacturing establishments are built on floating platforms and moved up the stream as they are needed. After the lumber is prepared in a sawmill it can be packed in a way that makes transportation much more economical than any system of logging.
