The team arrived yesterday from England and will debate in several places in the Maritime Provinces, including Saint John.

URGES CO-OPERATION.

He hoped that the Canadian university graduates could be induced to join the International Students' movement and believed that the difficulty of distance between the large centres of population could be overcome by enthusiastic co-operation. This would enable Canadian university men to take their place in the International Federation of Students which united the youth of the world in the cause of international understanding and good will.

EVOUNG TRIAL TO BE BEGUN NEXT WEEK

C. R. Mesereau is to Defend Him on Charge of Man-slaughter

The Grand Jury, empaneled for the January term of the Circuit Court, which opened yesterday, found a true bill on the charge of manslaughter in the case of the King vs. Mordock Evoung, convicted for murder in connection with the fatality in the Seamen's Institute on New Year's Eve, when Police Officer Stephen McCavour lost his life.

The jury retired to hear the evidence in the Evoung case at 11:30 yesterday morning, and at 3 o'clock returned with the announcement that they were unanimous in that they could find no bill for murder, the only charge in the indictment.

APPLICATION MADE.

On behalf of the Attorney-General, application was made by A. N. Carter, to have the charge changed to read "manslaughter" instead of "murder," and this was granted by Mr. Justice LeBlanc.

The jury then retired and heard the evidence again, after which they brought in a true bill on the new charge named in the indictment. Trial of this matter will be commenced on next Tuesday morning at 11 o'clock.

C. R. Mesereau, of this city, has been engaged as counsel to defend Evoung.

TRUE BILLS FOUND.

True bills were also found by the grand jury in cases of the King vs. George Robins and Leo Roba, charged with robbery with violence, and the King vs. George I. Collier and Margaret Collier, charged with theft of \$2,000 from Mrs. Jean Lavigne, of Pond street. Trial of these matters will follow the manslaughter case next week.

APPLICATIONS FOR GRANTS ARE FILED

City Asked to Contribute to Work of Various Organizations Are Laid on Table

The Common Council yesterday afternoon approved of the recommendation of the committee of the whole that the widow of Mayor F. L. Potts receive the amount due for the unpaid term of his office and this will be paid her in semi-monthly payments or in one sum, as she may elect.
