Kansas, Capper, Republican; Louisiana, Randall and Gay, Democrats; Maine, Fernald, Republican (elected last September); Massachusetts, Walsh, Democrat; Minnesota, Nelson, Republican; Mississippi, Harrison, Democrat; Missouri, Spencer, Republican; Nebraska, Morris, Republican; New Hampshire, Kayes and Moses, Republicans; New Jersey, Edge (long term), Bayard (short term), Republican; North Carolina, Simmons, Democrat; Oregon, Mulkey (short term), Republican; Rhode Island, Colt, Republican; South Carolina, Dial (long term) and Pollack (short term), Democrats; South Dakota, Sterling, Democrat; Tennessee, Shields, Democrat; Virginia, Martin, Democrat.
In election for the house former Speaker Cannon was returned to his seat from Illinois for what will be his twenty-second term; Meyer London, the only Socialist in the house, was defeated by former Representative Henry Goldfogle.

a Democrat, running with Republican endorsement. The loss of the Socialist seat, however, was offset by the election of another Socialist, Victor Berger of Milwaukee, who defeated Representative Stafford, a Republican. Berger previously served in the house and contested independently for a senate seat after being defeated in the Republican primaries. Senator Walsh was running ahead of Republican and Independent candidates.

To what extent the women of New York, exercising their suffrage for the first time, has been responsible for the close result in the state contest was not apparent early today. There were several women candidates for congress in the state, but all were defeated.


Representative Jeanette Rankin, of Montana, the first woman to hold a seat in congress, was not running for re-election to the house but contested independently for a senate seat after being defeated in the Republican primaries. Senator Walsh was running ahead of Republican and Independent candidates.

With 874 elections reported and sixty-one congressional districts in doubt, twenty-four Republicans won seats now occupied by Democrats and the Democrats gained seats from eight Republicans and one Socialist.

The Socialists made up their loss to the Democrats by taking a place from the Republicans. The Republicans made a net gain of fifteen seats on the returns thus far received, while the Democrats took eight places from the Republicans. The Socialist representation remains the same—one seat.

New York State.
New York, Nov. 6.—The final result of the contest for the governorship and other state offices in yesterday's election remained in doubt early today. Missing up-state districts which are normally Republican, were gradually cutting down the big lead, rolled up by Alfred W. Smith, Democrat, in New York, and indications were that the winner would be determined by the soldier and sailor vote.

With the city complete and 850 districts missing up-state Smith had 558,281 votes and Governor Whitman 528,692. The vote in 4,056 districts of the 4,606



outside the city gave Whitman 644,615 and Smith 415,610.

Boston, Nov. 5.—Former Governor David I. Walsh, Democrat, was elected United States senator from Massachusetts today, defeating Senator John W. Weeks, Republican, by a margin of approximately 16,000. Lieut. Governor Calvin Coolidge, Republican, was elected governor with a lead of about 9,000 over Richard H. Long, Democrat.

Champ Clark Defeated.
St. Louis, Nov. 5.—On the face of returns received early today it appears that Speaker Champ Clark has been defeated by four hundred votes by B. H. Dyer, Republican.

A Republican Sweep.
Providence, R. I., Nov. 5.—Rhode Island Republicans made a clean sweep of the state today, re-electing LeBaron B.
