

MISS BARB \RA WYLIE IS REALLY A CHARMING WOMAN.

> English Militant Suffragette Who Has Been Visiting In Canada on a Mission Connected With the Suffrage Agitation Likes Canada, But Suggests That We Have Much to Learn.

Miss Wylie, the English militant suffragette, who has been touring Canada addressing suffragette meetings and endoavoring to place the cause before the women of this country, is a very able and eloquent speaker. She has visited Toronto, Ottawa and Montreal and the principal cities of

the east before returning to England. Miss Wylie is a handsome type of an intellectual woman, keen and

an intellectual woman, keen and bright and good-looking and quite styl-ish in appearance. She is the very opposite from the Amazonian individ-ual that one would naturally expect to see when her record is taken into account. She has served two terms in English prisons and has several times been foremost in riotous attacks on English Cabinet Ministers and vig-orously defends the methods of the militant suffragettes of England. Few people in this country felt disposed to sympathize with those women in their aggressive methods but after listening to the explanations of Miss listening to the explanations of Miss Wylie and her eloquent defence of them almost every reasonable person now admit that there is certainly **much** to be said in favor of the mili-trat method.

much to be said in favor of the mili-tant methods. Miss Wylie's style of speaking is most winning. She possesses a beau-tiful, well modulated voice, a fluent delivery and is evidently deeply read and thorough conversant with public matters in English political life. Her delivery is of the pleasing, natural extempore style and no heckling or cross-questioning has the least effect in disturbing her. To every comment

Or question she at once has a sharp, pointed reply that almost invariably wins the sympathy and applause of her audience and even her most bitter opponents can not fail to admire the skill and ability with which she ar-gues the suffragette cause. She wears as ornaments two silver decorations which indicate her suffering for the militant cause. One is a gate of pris-om bars with chains symbolic of imprisonment and martyrdom and the other is a small brass tag with the

It has been pointed out that in old Rome books were actually produced and sold more easily and quickly than they are in modern times. With his trained staff of readers and transcrib-ers, it is contended, an ancient Roman publisher could turn out an edition of any work at very cheap rates and almost a moment's notice. There was, of course, no initial expense of typesetting before a single copy could be produced, no costly extras in the form of printer's corrections. The manuscript came from the author; the pub-lisher handed it to his slaves, and if the book were of ordinary dimensions the complete edition could, it is said, be ready if necessary within twenty-four hours. The old Roman libraries were immense as well as splendid. Plutarch says that the library of Lucullus, who expended much of his money on books, "had walks, galleries and cabinets open to all visitors." It was proposed by Julius Caesar to open this library to the public .- Harper's

> Eating In the Fifth Act of Life The advice which Sydney Smith gave

to Lord Murray on the subject of diet was probably sound. "If you wish for anything like happiness in the fifth act of life," he wrote, "eat and drink one-half of what you could eat and drink. Did I ever tell you my calculations about eating and drinking? Having ascertained the weight of what I could live upon so as to preserve health and strength, and what I did live upon, I found that between ten and seventy years of age I had eaten and drunk forty-four horse wagon loads of meat and drink more than would have preserved me in life and health. The value of this mass of ourishment I considered to be worth £7,000. It occurred to me that I must by my voracity, have starved to death fully 100 persons. This is a frightful calculation, but irresistibly true."

### How a Woman Saved Nice



Miss Wylie con-tends that the object of the English suffragettes is not to fight men but to co-operate with them in bringing about good progressive legislation, particularly that sort in which women are especially interested as affecting them as a class. She contends they are better able to judge of good laws for women than the men and would be most helpful in framing such use-ful legislation.


#### Dogs' Rest Established.
