JAMES BENNETT & LANGE—WILLIAM HAWKES IN HIS GRAVE.—The inquiry as to the death of Willie Hawkes was concluded last evening. The jury spent a few minutes in talking the matter over and then returned the following verdict: We, the jury, enquired to inquire the cause of the death of William Hawkes, say that the same was caused by a revolver that was fired by James Bennett at the Halifax wharf on Tuesday, the 15th inst.

The jury remarked that the person who sold Bennett the cartridges should be censured as should also those who sell him with the revolver and did not take possession of it. Young Bennett, who fired the shot which resulted in his death, was then discharged from custody.
