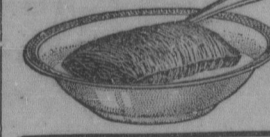
WAR SUMMARY

(Toronto Globe.)

In Pursuance of their audacious policy of slaughtering non-combatants, the Germans attacked Paris on Saturday night from above, and dropped upon the section of the city traversed by a Zeppelin raider three and a half tons of bombs. The raid was the most spectacular to which Paris has been subjected since the war began, and the loss of life was heavier than on any former occasion. Warning had been given before the Zeppelin approached Paris, and 30 French aeroplanes had ascended in search for it. When sighted the airship was 14,000 feet above the earth, and while the aeroplanes were climbing toward it the great vessel passed over one of the older quarters of the city and threw down its cargo of bombs. Although it was early in the evening the warning sent out permitted the shutting off of electric light, the closing of shutters and the darkening of windows. There could have been little to guide the airship at 14,000 feet altitude save the winding stretches of the darkness that before the Zeppelin dropped its bombs, it sent down a great flare with the object of determining whether it was passing over the city. The chief loss of life was occasioned in a six-story apartment building occupied by workmen and their families. Here ten victims were tried under the debris. No serious fires were caused, and the bombs were in most cases evidently filled with high explosives rather than of an incendiary nature.

It is difficult to understand the psychology of the mind which orders these examples of frightfulness. The raids do not terrorize the population of either London or Paris. The effect is to increase the determination of the people to make an end of a system of militarism which regards the death of women and children as a means of conquering and cowing a hostile nation. During the coming season these raids will, no doubt, be continued, and the casualties are likely to be materially increased, because the bombs are growing larger and more destructive. One of those which fell on Paris on Saturday night and failed to explode weighed six hundred pounds. It is quite possible that the super-Zeppelins alleged to be in process of completion in Germany may carry individual bombs weighing half a ton. The only result of the raids will be to madden the men at the

front and bring about a policy of reprisals.

While the Germans were attacking Paris by air their infantry on the western front was hurling itself against the French trenches south of the Somme. Twice on Saturday night the enemy attacked the French positions, and twice the assaulting columns were thrown back into their own trenches by the French rifle fire and by artillery action. The activity of the Germans in this region and in the sector north of Arras cannot be regarded merely as a demonstration in force. A serious attempt is undoubtedly in progress to crumple up the French front. On Friday night a breach was made on the banks of the Somme, and the village of Frise was captured. Berlin reports that the frontage of French trenches taken extended to about two miles. Seventeen officers and 1,270 men were made prisoners, among whom were some British soldiers.

In the Neuville region, also between Arras and Lens, there has been great activity. There the Germans claim that they have taken almost a mile of the French front-line trenches, and have captured a considerable number of their defenders. French official reports state that vigorous counter-attacks have been in progress, and that some parts of the trenches captured in the Neuville region have been recovered, together with a number of the French soldiers occupying them, who had been made prisoners by the Germans and had not been removed. It is apparently upon the French portion of the front that the brunt of the attack has fallen. There has been no special activity along the lines in Flanders and northern France held by the British army. The presence of British soldiers on the banks of the Somme shows that the lines held by the British troops have been extended considerably to the south, the scene of Saturday's fighting being near the point of junction of Sir Douglas Haig's army with that of General Joffre. It is probable that the German attacks will be continued in this region. When the necessary concentration has been made for such a movement as that now in progress it is likely to be proceeded with until it is successful, or it has been shown that the lines of the French cannot be penetrated.

Despatches from Athens state that the Turkish authorities have fled from Erzurum, and that the Russians are now surrounding the city, which is still strongly held. It is added that a Russian column is advancing southward towards the Tigris valley. This news is not official. Should it be confirmed it may prove of the highest importance. Petrograd announces that the Russian Caucasian operations are widening to the westward southwestward and southward, with the possibility in mind of joining hands of the British Mesopotamia expedition.

It is announced in London that Sir Percy Lake has joined the relief expedition which is now making its way up the Tigris toward Kut-el-Amara. He reports that the weather continues bad, and that the whole country is deep in mud, making the movements of troops very difficult.

On the western Russian front there has been little movement. Along the middle Stripa the troops of General Ivanoff have been under attack by the Austrians, who, it is reported, were repulsed.

The Austrian and Italian official reports tell of intense artillery action in the Trentino, in Carnia and on the upper Isonzo.

Rumors of increasing friction between the King of Greece and the Allied powers continue. The landing of a small party of marines in Crete and the making prisoner there of a German agent indicate that General Sarrail is determined to make an end of the menace to the military position and operations of the Allied troops in the eastern Mediterranean.

Sunday recruiting meetings were warmly defended by Lieut.-Col. J. G. Wright at Toronto.

A new record in recruiting for a week was reached with a total of 1,294 men at Toronto.
