THE YORK ELECTION.

THE GOVERNMENT VICTORIOUS IN A
BITTERLY CONTESTED BATTLE.

Hon. Mr. Blair and His Colleagues Re-
turned by a Handsome Majority—
The Opposition Lost Each Party
Fought to Win—Liquor Abolished.

FRIDAY, OCT. 24.—The great con-
test in York is over and the govern-
ment have secured a great victory. It is years
since even in York, where political
feeling always runs high, there has
been such a bitter political contest, or
one in which as great an effort was
made to defeat four candidates as that
of yesterday. But from the outset—not
withstanding the statements made by
the Sun and Gleason, there never was any
doubt of the final result of the polling.
Mr. Blair and his colleagues had been
good representatives for York and the
people in almost every district of the
county recognized this by giving them
increased majorities. The vote brought
out was much larger than at the general
election of last year.

At noon yesterday it was learned that
money was an important factor on the
opposition side, and for a time it was
thought that large expenditures in the
city of Fredericton might outdo the
government majority in the city and im-
peril the chances of the less general-
ly known candidates. But it did not.
The government had a large majority in
the city than they anticipated and the
returns from the majority of districts
outside show increased majorities over
those estimated a few days ago. In-
deed it is claimed that had the election
been deferred a few days the chances
of the government would have been
greatly improved and the majority
increased by some hundreds. As it
is, however, as will be seen by the
returns elsewhere the result is highly sat-
isfactory to supporters of the govern-
ment. The election was conducted very
orderly and far as the party managers
are concerned. In fact there was no
disturbance of any kind in the
city and none are reported from
the only voting districts outside, and
being the immense quantity of liquor
that could be obtained for the sake
of the quiet of the town remarkable
stronghold hardly imagine himself
in a prohibition town. Were liquor used
to the same extent in elections in
other parts of the province would raise a whirlwind of indigna-
tion against the liquor law. But here
where no liquor is sold, and the streets
were filled all day long with
men in all stages of intoxication. Half
of the drunks of the town seemed to
have bottles, and it was not unusual to
see a couple of gentlemen taking a quiet
"pull" out of a quart bottle within a few
feet of the most public thoroughfare
in the city. Liquor was as free as water
and this in a city that has four occa-
sions cast majorities in favor of the Scott
Act.

After the contest it was very evident
that the opposition voters thought
they would carry the election, but
the returns show that the govern-
ment carried the city and the provin-
ce. It was a surprise to many who
came from St. Croix cast a damper
on their feelings and the Millville
returns which came in next showed the
government to have a large majority
to depress their spirits. The returns
from the city of Fredericton were also
unsatisfactory. Maryville and the
other districts outside the city were
sent their spirits up but these gains
were rapidly cut down by the arrival
of news from other districts.

place where information could be ob-
tained was being in a noisy, angry
and excited condition. The govern-
ment was victorious in the city and
the province. The opposition voters
were disappointed and the govern-
ment voters were jubilant. The
election was a great success for the
government and a great defeat for
the opposition.
