

## The New Teachers

Results of the Annual Examination of Candidates for Certificates.

Complete Returns Which Will End the Suspense of Many British Columbians.

A great deal of interest has been taken in the results of the Provincial Teachers' Examinations and the Times is indebted to the Superintendent of Education, Mr. Alex. Robinson, for the opportunity of making public at the earliest possible moment the lists of the successful candidates.

Steamer Victoria of the Northern Pacific line, Capt. John Patton, arrived this morning from the east. She left Hongkong on July 4th with a full cargo for the Japanese coast and this side of the water. After calling at Amoy, Shanghai, and Kobe, the steamer made a start across the Pacific from Yokohama on the morning of July 19th with a large and valuable cargo of tea, silk, rice and general merchandise. She had a splendid passage, with experienced weather and light variable winds, until reaching port this morning. She brought 10 cabin passengers, amongst whom were Dr. and Mrs. Moore-Graham, of Kobe, who go to Seattle as well as the steamer. Yesterday made a trip to this side a short time ago, to "pay out the land." Another passenger was Mr. Bell, an American business man who has been looking over the commercial possibilities of the Philippines, and who returns highly pleased with the prospects there. Mr. and Mrs. Lanover were on a tour around the world. There were 6 European steerage passengers, 8 Japanese and 140 Chinese. After unloading her freight for this port she proceeded to Tacoma this afternoon. On her arrival at the City of Destiny the liner will be transformed into a transport, having been chartered to carry horses and possibly a troop of cavalry, to the Orient.

Steamer Willapa will sail for Clayoquot and ports along the West Coast this evening. Among those booked to sail by her are ex-Governor Dewdney and F. T. Childs, who go to Alberni; W. M. Brewster, formerly purser of the steamer Queen City, who goes to Clayoquot to act as manager there for Messrs. T. Earle & Co.; Mrs. Matilda Douglas, Capt. Ross Munro, Mrs. Logan, J. E. Sulton and Col. Haynes and party.

Steamer Tees will not sail for Alaskan ports until to-morrow evening. She will have a large number of passengers and considerable freight. Among those booked to sail by her are a party of several Northwest Mounted Policemen, who will join her at Vancouver. Warburton Pike will go to the Stikine country. Other passengers ticketed are Mrs. Lewis and family, B. Potts, H. Genn and M. Conway.

## Local News.

(From Tuesday's Daily.)

It is generally understood that Rev. J. A. Vichet has accepted the pastorate of Calvary Baptist church. Mr. Vichet has gone back to Manitoba to bid farewell to his congregation there.

Enquiries made of Dr. Hermann Robertson, the physician in charge of the case of Captain Hermann Smith, result in it being learned that the patient is now very much better, and in a fair way to a speedy recovery.

Upon the arrival of the noon train to town, William Edwards and others, who have served several terms, and who is but recently out of jail, was arrested by Constable Atkins of the provincial police force. He is charged with the theft of postoffice receipts and other articles from Metro, servant to Mr. J. J. of Koflah.

The train to Duncan this morning was crowded with the little ones from the B. C. Protestants and their friends. The faces of the little folk were pictures of delightful anticipation as they crowded to the windows of the railway cars and their elders looked no less happy in view of the delightful time expected.

Arrangements are being made for a public meeting at the city hall a week from to-morrow night, when the leading advocates of the "pot holes" in this city and the officials of the Los Angeles Eastern railway will address the electorate on the subject of ferry connection. A request has been forwarded to the mayor, asking him to summon such a meeting.

Secretary Baxter, of the John Irving Navigation Company, received a letter from Commodore Irving this morning stating that he had secured exclusive control of the tramway from Taku City to Atlin Lake and his company was therefore the only one which could quote through fares from Bennett to Atlin. James intended to use the money to pay off those working on the claim.

Dr. Kirker, R.N., delivered a very interesting address at last night's meeting of the Natural History Society, the subject being the "pot holes" recently discovered by him at Esquimalt. They consist of circular holes in the rocks about four feet deep, situated high up on rocky ledges. It is believed that they were caused by the wearing action of stones in rushing water, probably during the glacial period. Some of the stones found at the bottom were perfectly round, due to the grinding action.

The semi-annual general meeting of the V. I. Building Society was held last evening, when the statements of the secretary and treasurer, showing the affairs of the society to be in a most satisfactory condition, were read and adopted. The 110th drawing for an appropriation was conducted by a committee consisting of Messrs. H. Moss, G. A. Grace and W. Marchant. The lucky number was 94; shares A and B of which were held by Mrs. E. Chislett, entitling her to an appropriation of \$2,000.

Last November a sailor named Wm. H. Drummond, deserted from the flag-ship Imperieuse, and although diligent search for him was instituted, no trace of him could be found. Subsequently he was captured by Constable Jones at Thurlo Islands. The means of obtaining him were, however, insufficient for the purpose, and he was confined in the hotel room in which he was confined. Last night, acting on information from Vancouver, Supt. Hussey despatched Officers Atkins and Campbell to search the Thurlo Islands. Some time later they discovered their man shipped as a common seaman on board the vessel. He was taken into custody and handed over to the authorities at Esquimalt. Drummond has a wife and family in Vancouver.

Tolmie school board met last evening, when general routine business was considered and passed for the year. Out of 15 applicants for the position of principal, Mr. R. Watson, late of Salt Spring Island, was chosen.

As mentioned in the Times some weeks ago, the Cowichan Agricultural Society will construct a chunder bicycle race track, and the society is now invited for the construction of the same. It is intended that a bicycle gymkana during the exhibition which will be held September 29 and 30.

An inquest is being held this afternoon on the body of Frank Bowser, whose body was found yesterday in a cove on the beach near Esquimalt. Dr. Hart, considered an inquest necessary, as, according to the present act, a certificate for burial could not otherwise be given. Some difficulty has been experienced in securing the insurance on the life of Geo. Peart, Bowser's companion, there being no official proof of his death. The finding of the jury this afternoon, namely that of accidental drowning, it is hoped will remove this difficulty.

James S. Murray was arraigned in the city police court this morning on a charge of assault, the complainant being John R. Chaffield. The latter is a law student and has been living at the Vernon. He states that a day or two ago he was having his effects removed from the Vernon, having decided to change

his lodgings. He had been unable to find Mrs. Walt, the proprietress, to pay her, and as he came down stairs he was assaulted by Murray, who charged him with attempting to leave the building without settling his board bill. Chaffield says he tried to ward off the attack of Murray with his portmanteau, but received an ugly blow in the eye and several lesser blows. The further hearing of the case was adjourned until four o'clock.

A very pretty but quiet wedding took place at the Queen's Hotel this morning, the contracting parties being Fred Ward Ewen, of Tacoma, and Nina Dixon, of Seattle. The ceremony was performed by Rev. Geo. F. Swinnerton, B.A.

The coroner's jury empaneled yesterday, returned a verdict to the effect that Mr. Frank Bowser came to his death by drowning by the capsizing of a canoe. Immediately after the inquest the remains were interred in Ross Bay cemetery, the services being conducted by Rev. Mr. Sharpe.

A despatch from Toronto, under the British Columbia Pharmacy Association has made a reciprocal arrangement with the Ontario Association, whereby British Columbia and Ontario druggists holding necessary diplomas will be entitled to practice in either province without having to pass further examinations.

From Dawson comes news of more robberies. Late arrivals from the northern capital tell of a robbery of \$1,500 from a Dawson saloon. Early on the morning of August 21st some one unknown to the proprietors, King & Gowan, picked up a sack containing \$1,500 worth of dust from behind the bar of the Grotto and quietly walked away. Gowan was alone in the place and chanced to drop off into a doze, when the thief entered and helped himself. No arrests were made. Another robbery occurred on the 19th of July, when \$1,223 in gold dust was stolen from Mr. James, of No. 12 Eldorado. Just before noon James left his cabin to go to Claim No. 32, further up the creeks, and on his return found the tin can in which he kept the gold was missing. No trace was found of the robber, and no one on the claim is suspected. James intended to use the money to pay off those working on the claim.

## THE XORA HEARD FROM.

The Little Sloop Has Made Over Two Thousand Miles—Put Into San Blas, Mexico, for Mail and Supplies.

It would seem that the prophecies of disaster for the sloop Xora have not yet been realized, and that on the contrary the daring adventurers who risked their lives on board the little vessel have so far succeeded beyond the most sanguine expectations.

It will be remembered that the Xora left port on July 5th and was delayed several days, nearly a week, in Sooke harbor. Mrs. J. C. Voss, of the Queen's Hotel, yesterday received a telegram from Mr. Voss, sent from San Blas, Mexico, announcing the safe arrival of the sloop there.

San Blas is something over two thousand miles from Victoria, and the time made is therefore exceptionally good, averaging more than 100 miles a day.

Mr. Voss says the Xora will remain at San Blas until the crew receives mail from Victoria, about ten days, and it is likely that Captain McCord will send to his friends in Victoria a description of the run down the coast.

Whatever may be the opinion entertained as to the wisdom of the undertaking upon which the crew of the Xora embarked, it will be a matter of sincere congratulation to the friends of those on board that so prosperous a commencement has been made. Of course the dangers of the voyage may be commencing, the general impression being that the greatest task will be the rounding of the Horn, but in the voyage so far, the seaworthy qualities of the boat must have been well tested.

Mr. Voss intimates in his telegram that all on board are well and not a bit the worse for the long voyage.
