

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DEAN OF CANTERBURY DEAD.

London, April 1.-The Times this morning announces the death of Very Rev. Robert Payne Smith, dean of Canterbury. He was born in 1818. Dr. Smith was at one time under-libra-rian of Bodlian, at Oxford university, and was the author of many works. He was a member of the Old Testament revision company In 1865 he was appointed to succeed Dr. Jacobson as regius professor of divinity in the university of Oxford, and in 1871 was raised to the deanery of Canterbury
