VESSELS ARRIVE AT QUEBEC SEASON OPENED.

Steamer and Schooner Floated—Dangers to Navigation

SCHOONER FLOATED.

The schooner Neva from Boston for Bear River, was adrift yesterday morning on the east side of Digby Gut, and was pulled off four hours later by the lifeboat without damage and proceeded to her destination.

HARBOR FRONT NOTES.

The C. P. R. steamer Montreal, for London and Antwerp, took away Canadian goods valued at \$140,422, and foreign goods valued at \$15,968, making a total valuation of \$276,390. Her wheat shipments are 35,696 bushels.

THE BATTLE LINE.

There are now three steamships belonging to Messrs. William Thomson and Co. at Havre. The Hlmara, Capt. Toque, arrived on the 19th; Eretia, Capt. Crossley, on the 20th, and the Albura, Capt. Lockhart, on the 21st. They all arrived from Santa Fe.

ARRIVED AT QUEBEC.

Quebec, April 21.—Steamer Sokoto, arrived from Puerto, Mexico via Louisbourg, arrived here at 5:30 p. m. Sunday and proceeded to Montreal. She encountered a snowstorm between Pather Point and Lislet. The steamer Montreal left here on Saturday afternoon for Cabot Straits to assist navigation by informing vessels by wireless telegraph of the condition and position of the ice in the Gulf. Steamer Cascapedia leaves here for Montreal on Monday morning to resume her trips between Montreal, Quebec and the Maritime Provinces.

The steamer Athena, Capt. Black, bound to St. John from Glasgow, was 150 miles east of Sable Island at 9:40 a. m. yesterday.

A BUSY PORT.

Sarnia, Ont., April 21.—Like other Great Lakes ports, Sarnia, Ont., is now humming with activity in preparation for the impending opening of navigation which will be on April 23rd. It will come as a surprise to many people to learn that Sarnia, at the head of the St. Clair river, the entrance to Lake Huron, is a gateway through which more tonnage passes than any other one point in the world, there being an average of one vessel, either up or down, every five minutes throughout the day.

It is claimed by his friends that he will be able to poll a large vote in the St. John valley, which is always overwhelmingly Republican, and that without this vote, no Democrat can hope to do much in eastern Maine, outside of Penobscot county.
