

### CHILDREN'S AID SOCIETY HOLD MEETING AT COAL MINES IN QUEENS CO.

Report of the Secretary Read Dealing With Activities of the Month.

The report of Rev. W. R. Robinson, secretary of the Children's Aid Society, of work done during the past month, submitted to the monthly meeting of the board last evening, revealed social conditions in relation to neglected children, desertion of wives by husbands, and extreme poverty as a result of neglect of the most shocking conditions in a general way. Mr. Robinson supplemented it by stories of particular cases which were pathetic in the extreme. The following is the summary of the report: No. of cases reported to Society... 69 No. investigated... 59 No. of children placed in Society's Home... 10 No. of children whose homes were found... 9 No. of children placed in Roman Catholic institutions... 7 No. of children returned to parents, homes having been made... 11 No. of children sent to Municipal Home... 11 No. of children in Kings County with parents... 2 No. of children sent home to Nova Scotia... 3 No. of children for whom food, clothing, fuel and fuel were supplied... 67 No. of children medically treated... 7 No. of children involved in these families... 103 No. of neglectful fathers dealt, either by personal interview, by letters of warning or in the court... 26 No. of adults sent to Municipal Home... 4 No. of letters of warning sent... 21 No. of deserted wives applying for aid... 19 No. of persons for whom situations were found... 24 No. of boys paroled to parents... 17 The president, A. M. Belding, remarked that as the secretary had his pastoral duties and many others to perform, in addition to his work for the society, it was clear that if the society had an agent devoting his whole time to its work, there would be a very much larger number of cases; and the secretary supplemented the remark by saying that he had on his book quite a number of cases which he had not yet found time to investigate, although some of them were serious.

### HONORED WITH KNIGHTHOOD

Chief Justice McLeod Among Those Recently Announced According to London Paper The Globe last night says: "The London, England Overseas Mail, February 7, received today, in the list of new knights prints the following with many others: 'The Hon. E. McLeod, Chief Justice of New Brunswick.' When asked about the matter last night the Chief Justice said that he had not as yet received any official notification of the honor, but as he had not seen his mail since Monday, 1910, and he is certain, will be glad to hear of the honor which was in the post office waiting for him. The friends of Chief Justice McLeod, and they are legion, will be glad to hear of the honor which rounds out a career of public usefulness seldom equaled. Sir Ezekiel McLeod was born at Cardwell, Kings county, October 29, 1840, and from early youth took an active part in the political affairs of the country. In the year 1882 he was elected to the House of Representatives and offered the position of attorney-general in the Liberal government and was appointed to that office in 1886. In the year 1886 he again contested the constituency but was defeated. A little later in the same year he was nominated with C. Everett as a candidate for the Dominion House of Commons, but was defeated. He was again a candidate in 1891 and this time again was elected, and made a splendid representative. In 1896 he was appointed to the Supreme Court bench of this province, and a few years ago he was made Chief Justice of the Court of Appeal. Sir Ezekiel began the study of law in the office of the late Judge Fisher, and after being with him for two years, he obtained his LL. B. in 1867, in 1900 he was given the degree of LL. D. by the U. N. B. He was admitted attorney in 1867 and was a barrister one year later. He was for a number of years a director of the St. John Law School. He has been a member of the Senate of the U. N. B. since 1889, and will have completed 48 years of service in that capacity in May of this year.

### OBITUARY.

Miss Edith M. Machum. The death of Miss Edith M. Machum, aged 24 years, youngest daughter of G. Alfred and Esther (Howe) Machum, occurred at the residence of her parents at Jerusalem, Queens Co., N. B., on Wednesday morning, 7th inst. Miss Machum was a young woman of much promise, bright and cheerful disposition endeared her to a large circle of friends. She was a graduate of the Provincial Normal School and had taught in the schools of Queens and other places. Besides her parents, Miss Machum is survived by two brothers and two sisters, Harry A. Alfred M. G. Mrs. B. A. Howe and Miss Lellis, all of Jerusalem. Mr. E. R. Machum and Mr. Harry W. Machum, of this city, are uncles of the deceased. Interment will take place at Jerusalem on Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

W. H. Venning. The death of W. H. Venning occurred on Tuesday at his home, "Hillcroft," Sussex, N. B. Mr. Venning was formerly of this city, his father, Wm. N. Venning, being a well known Jeweller of King street. He was born in Rockville, July 5, 1822, and educated at Newcastle with Hon. Peter Mitchell and was his life long friend. He started life as a printer and at the time of Confederation was appointed inspector of fisheries for New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, which position he filled for more than twenty-two years, always with the interest of the fisheries at heart. An ardent sportsman, an expert angler of the old school, he was regarded as one of the best authorities on fish in Eastern America, and his articles appeared from time to time in the leading sporting papers of America under the nom de plume of "The Old Angler."

Mr. Venning was twice married. First to Miss Potter of Sussex, by whom he had four children, Mrs. Abbot of Minneapolis, Mrs. Pettigrew of New York, R. N., late of the fishery department, Ottawa, and Charles, of San Diego. His second wife was the daughter of Major Samuel Gosline of Studholm, by whom he had three children, Mrs. H. D. Whitten of Montreal, Mrs. W. C. R. Anderson, of Montreal, and William at home. Mr. Venning is survived by two sisters, Mrs. Dimock and Mrs. Jost of


