

2. WILLIAM T. CARDY. — Born in Salisbury, Eng., Feb. 15, 1814. Died July 27, 1871. He was converted when in the nineteenth year of his age, and was soon appointed a local preacher. He entered the ministry in 1834, and travelled in the itinerant work, in Wales, two years. He subsequently attended the Theological Institution in England. He was then sent to St. Domingo, and labored in the West Indies, in the Mission work, fifteen years.

After being reduced to great prostration of health by the debilitating character of the climate, he obtained the permission of the Missionary Committee to try the climate of New Brunswick. He laboured with unceasing fidelity on the Saint John South Circuit; and his undaunted and unwearied labors during the awful visitation of cholera, in 1854, will long be remembered there. He was, indeed, a faithful Minister of our Lord Jesus Christ, and during the years of his residence within the bounds of our Conference gave most pleasing evidence of his entire devotion to God.

For the last eight years he was the subject of distressing illness, — the result, undoubtedly, of the enervating climate, the wasting labours, and the various persecutions and afflictions of his West Indian Mission. He was a saintly man; and though, owing to the fact of his removal, for his family's sake, to Chicago, three years ago, he was not privileged to see any of his ministerial brethren, he gave abundant evidence of his perfect preparation for his heavenly inheritance.
