WHEAT-ADEQUATE SUPPLY OF BOX CARS-ABILITY OF PRODUCERS TO DELIVER

Mr. S. J. Korchinski (Mackenzie): Mr. Speaker, my question is directed to the Minister of Transport. Earlier I asked the minister whether there would be an assurance from the railways that adequate box cars would be supplied to all country delivery points so that at least a minimum five-bushel quota could be delivered. Can the minister bring us up to date on what are the hopes for the supply of box cars by the railways inasmuch as there are only a few days left before the end of the crop year?

Hon. Jean-Luc Pepin (Minister of Industry, Trade and Commerce): Mr. Speaker, I was in touch with the Chief Commissioner of the Wheat Board just a few minutes ago. He assured me that maximum efforts are being made by the railways in order to reach the objective which is the five-bushel quota level. I may say in passing that 940 stations are now on a five-bushel quota, 709 are now on a four-bushel quota and 167 on three bushels. So there is progress every-day. It is still considered physically possible to reach the objective, but I must add immediately that difficulties have arisen in recent days because of unusually large offerings by producers as a result of circumstances with which the hon. member is familiar.

Mr. Korchinski: In view of the fact that there are only a few more days left, would the Wheat Board immediately open up the remaining delivery points to the five-bushel quota and concentrate on the delivery of a sufficient number of box cars?

Mr. Pepin: I hope I understand the hon. up of all delivery points and telling everyquota, this would not do much in reality to even more next year.

> Mr. Stan Schumacher (Palliser): May I ask the minister whether he would give consideration to recommending changes in Wheat Board regulations to allow deliveries to elevators with space that now have a five-bushel quota by those people who cannot deliver to points that have no space and are only on a four-bushel quota, so that at the end of the crop year all the available elevator space will be utilized?

> Hon. W. G. Dinsdale (Brandon Souris): I have a supplementary question, Mr. Speaker. Will the block system of grain movement recently introduced by the Canadian Wheat Board and referred to by the Minister without Portfolio last evening as one of the government's solutions to this problem assist in a major way in ensuring the delivery of the five-bushel quota at all delivery points? If not, what other emergency plan has the government in mind to deal with this problem?
