"With the danger of the importation of native labor under contract or agreement removed, there remain for consideration only such classes as might desire to emigrate from India or other countries, or as having left India and gone elsewhere, might be induced to emigrate to this country. To the immigration of the latter class, the regulation of the Canadian government requiring continuous passage from the country of which they are natives or citizens and upon through tickets should prove an effective bar, whilst as to the former the same regulation and warnings issued by the government of India and greater care which it may reasonably be expected steamship companies will exercise in future, should prove a real deterrent.

There was a representative meeting of the board of trade and night and much business of general importance was discussed. The noteworthy part of the proceedings, however, was the endorsement of the report of the freight rate committee and a passage of a resolution forwarding that report to the Railway Commission without any further waiting upon the C. P. R. officials. Those present: F. D. Starkey, president, E. K. Beeson, secretary, H. Byers, E. B. McDermid, W. A. Macdonald, A. Lean, F. M. Lay, G. P. Wells, T. Stark, A. W. Dyer, W. W. Bear, C. W. It is understood that unless some change is made in the new civil service act, as now drafted, one of the most important of the new features will be the elimination of the present system of annual statutory increases. Instead of the arrangement which has hitherto existed, whereby all employees on the permanent staff get regular yearly increases until the maximum for their class is reached, the government proposes that hereafter the increases shall only be granted each year on the recommendation of the departmental minister. Thus the businesslike principles will be adopted of rewarding the civil service employees on the basis of merit alone, and the drosses in the service will have to contend with the minimum amount allowed for the respective classes. It is also the intention to reclassify the whole service, and it is stated that the present intention to divide the service into two main classes and the clerical or professional class, as in the former will be included all officials who hold responsible positions requiring the exercise of executive ability and the oversight of various departments or branches. The clerical class will, as the term suggests, include the greater body of the service, who are employed principally in doing clerical work under the supervision of the higher officials.

After the reading of the minutes correspondence was read between the board of trade and the Railway Commission with reference to Kootenay freight rates. The commission wanted to know whether the Kootenay would agree to the decision as between Portage la Prairie and Winnipeg and whether the Nelson board would consent to the board as at present constituted making a decision upon the matter submitted to board as lately constituted. To this reply was made that Nelson would agree to the decision which might prejudice its cause, it knowing nothing of the case between Portage la Prairie and Winnipeg and that the Nelson board had prepared a case against the board which they had passed a resolution endorsing the petition presented by the silver-lead mine owners as to an extension of the period of lead bounty.

One of the chief difficulties now before the government in the matter of making a final draft of the bill is in connection with the classification of those now on the civil service list under these respective divisions. It is understood that the minimum salary now allowed in the different classes of the service will be increased under the new act, and that the increase in the total expenditure for salaries will hereafter be considerably offset by the fact that only a proportion of the total number of employees will get the regular yearly increases now granted.

The Victoria board of trade notified the Nelson board that they had passed a resolution endorsing the petition presented by the silver-lead mine owners as to an extension of the period of lead bounty. Further correspondence was read with the C. P. R. as to the change of service upon Kootenay lake, a change which had promptly been made at the instance of the board. The original proposal was that the C. P. Telephone company was communicated with. The company replied promising to install the line this summer but would not take the expense of reducing the rate, \$4 per annum, in the near future. Six months must be paid in advance or a note signed in lieu thereof for payment within 30 days.

**BANK OF MONTREAL**

MONTREAL, May 15.—The Dominion Iron and Steel company's officials today received a cablegram from the solicitors in London holding the Dominion Coal company's solicitors responsible for the delay in the hearing of the steel case before the privy council. The coal company, according to the cable has not yet completed the printing of the record which they are obliged to print in order to permit of filing the case within the prescribed date. This is in direct contradiction to the cables received by the Dominion Coal company from their London solicitors, who placed all blame for the delay on the steel company.

A letter from the Dominion fair authorities at Calgary advised the Nelson committee that the C. P. R. would give a single fare for exhibitors and judges. **Man Who Exposed Work of the Golden Circle in American War**  
CHICAGO, May 15.—Felix Grundy Stidger, the exposé of the "Golden Circle," dropped dead at his home on Monday night and was buried today. He was scarcely known by his neighbors and having only a small acquaintance with the civil war veterans of Chicago, his death attracted little attention here. He had passed away 45 years ago, general Grant might have taken two more summers in Richmond. Stidger was a secret service man during the last two years of the war. He worked his way into that notorious secret order of southerners in the northern states known as the "Knights of the Golden Circle" and became one of its chief officers. When the secret order was about ready to give up the conflict after the battles of Gettysburg and Vicksburg, its spirit was rejuvenated by the knowledge that this order had plans set for the delivery of 40,000 Confederate prisoners in Fort Douglas, in Chicago, and other northern cities. Plans also had been made for delivering over to the confederacy the soldiers of Illinois, Missouri, Indiana and Ohio.

**GRANBY SHIPMENTS**  
High Grade Ore From the Crescent Mine for the Trail Smelter  
Phoenix, May 3.—The ore shipments from the Granby mines for the month of April were \$128,200, considerably less than the record of March but greater than for any month previous to March. The decrease from the March tonnage was the result of one or more of the furnaces being out of commission while being connected

with the new steel tube draft chamber. The shipments from the Granby mines for the first four months of 1908 were \$372,700, as compared with \$399,000 shipped during the same months of 1907. The Crescent, one of the high grade ore mines in Skylark camp, shipped 20 tons of gold silver ore to the Consolidated smelter at Trail on Saturday. The latter was shipped from the Crescent and sent to the Trail smelter in February and is said to have run about \$100 per ton in gold and silver. After a steep of six months the B. C. Copper company's mines are again in operation, the whistles of the Mother Lode Emma and Oro Denoro are blowing regularly and many miners have started to work so there is rejoicing throughout the Boundary.
