## ESTIMABLE LADY PASSES AWAY

Mrs. Christian Kumpf, called away to Jesus Silent Majority. She passed away last night about 11 o'clock one of Waterloo's most highly respected residents, in the person of Mrs. Christian Kumpf, at the ripe old age of 85 years. Although not in the best of health the past few months having suffered a slight stroke last February still she was able to be up and around and yesterday she was exceptionally cheerful. Last evening she enjoyed an automobile ride and on returning complained of shortness of breath and while nothing serious was anticipated the family physician was called but death ensued in spite of the most skillful attention about 11 o'clock.

The deceased was born in Byrnes Grove, Kilkenny, Ireland, March 4th, 1834 and at the age of 9 years she came to Canada with her parents and settled in Preston. Four years later she removed to Waterloo and for 20 years has been a resident here. She was loved and respected by all and her benevolent and true Christian character endeared her into the hearts of the entire community who will learn with regret of her passing.

## TOOK HORSE AND RIG

On Monday afternoon a young man by the name of Lorenz entered the stable of Mr. W. House on Waterloo street and took a horse and rubber buggy. On not returning at night the police were notified and was not until yesterday afternoon that the young man was apprehended by Chief Flynn near Heidelberg and the horse and rig recovered. According to Lorenz's story he had no intention of keeping the outfit merely to visit friends in the country and while he had intended returning Monday evening he never on Tuesday to help a farmer and was on his way home when he was taken into custody. He was brought before P.M. Weir in police court this morning and remanded for a few days.

## BUSY SESSION OF PARK BOARD

The Board of Park management met last night when several matters of importance were discussed. The members were all present when Chairman Wells called the meeting to order and after passing accounts and other routine business the Board got down to work.

Not Satisfied With Brick. There was considerable dissatisfaction expressed in regard to the quality of brick to be used in the Women's rest room, the committee in charge not being satisfied the brick not being according to samples. To have this changed now would hold up the building but the Board did not feel satisfied in accepting them until the matter was further discussed. The board inspected the brick this morning and will get into communication with the contractor before the work is proceeded with.

There was considerable discussion regarding the erecting of bill boards on King street. The attention of the board had been brought to one which was erected at present and while the board may not have any objection they will find out where they stand and the following resolution will be sent on to the town Council. That the erection of bill boards on any civic property is not generally approved of in up to date towns or cities and that the board disapprove of the erection of such bill boards in this town as being a retrograde step and that the proposed erection of a bill board on the property on King street be not permitted, if the bylaws of the town furnish the necessary authority to stop such erection.

Board Purchased Grand Stand. For sometime the purchase of the grand stand has been under consideration and last evening the board decided to purchase same and early next Spring it will be put in shape so as to conform with the surroundings of the rest of the park. The sum asked was a very small one and the board felt justified in doing that. It did and as several of the shareholders of the grand stand Company have signified their intention of relinquishing their share to the town the price will be a very small one. The Board adjourned at 11 o'clock.

London, Oct. 22.—Economy is watchword of the session of Parliament which opens to-day, and efforts are to be made by members of the House of Commons to throw into discard the military programme outlined in the last budget, the new education scheme and the proposal to construct at cost of thousands of homes for working men, commitments, national policy regarding Governmental military and financial Russia, military occupation of Ireland and the plan for Irish Home Rule, and the Labor party's demand for nationalization of mines and railways.

## HENDRIE REPLIES TO STATEMENT OF LEADER DEWART



## CANADIAN CABOOSE FLIES ROYAL STANDARD

When the party of the Princes of Wales left their canoes at Cameron's Falls, they inspected the power development under construction there by the Ontario Hydro-Electric Commission. lay the concrete down. He agreed with the first speaker in taxing the people living along the highway a sufficient tax for maintenance. He believed that money spent on such roads is money well spent. He compared the cost of concrete road with the cost of gravel on a twenty year basis, the former would be very much cheaper and would last much longer. Mr. Bohlender, Reeve of Waterloo thought it was just to charge the people along the highway a tax for maintenance, and when the township comes to Waterloo, he will see that Waterloo will take care of their end. Mr. P.P. Stumpf, Reeve of Elmira followed with a few appropriate remarks to the Reeve and the Council for the Township Reeve that he would guarantee that Elmira would do their part when they came this way.

Mr. A.Y. Little, Reeve of Dumfries, considered the new concrete road a great piece of work. He congratulated the Reeve and the Council for the spirit they have shown in taking up concrete roads. Mr. A. Y. Little, in his remarks said that the Woolwich Township has set an example not only for the county of Waterloo, but also for the whole of the Province. It brings substantial progress for the county of Waterloo. It is a wise improvement with which the Reeve and Council will be well pleased. Mr. Frank Meyer, ex-Reeve of Elmira in his remarks said that he fought a year ago for permanent concrete roads when the County Council convened. Mr. Geo. Kijack, Elmira, spoke briefly. He was the only speaker who found fault with the new piece of road, in his own words: "The only fault I find with this new road is because it's too short on each end."

Of course he was forgiven by all present. In another year we shall have a much larger piece of good concrete road. Very good piece of advice he gave was that the tributaries leading to the highway should be looked after by the council. He also spoke on having the Council appoint a man to look after any deficiencies that might occur on the highway. Mr. A. Winger, Elmira, and Mr. J. Petch of Linwood spoke well of the Woolwich Reeve and Council on their good work in building a substantial road for the township. On the drainage of the road Mr. Cassel spoke very favorably. It was a natural drainage, open ditches, and good outlet and couldn't be very well improved upon.

The annual report of Assessment Commissioner M. Huehnergard as given above shows a total taxable assessment of \$14,807,282, an increase of \$2,201,136 for the year. This increase by wards is as follows: North, \$487,425; centre, \$268,614; east, \$125,285; south, \$199,232; west, \$292,323. Added to these is the increase on income amounting to \$99,242. Adding the non-taxable assessment of \$1,592,532 to the taxable, \$14,807,282, there is a grand total assessment of \$16,599,814. The population increases by wards are as follows: North, 927; centre, 198; east, 217; south, 278 and west, 265. The total population increase is 1,385.
