CITY COUNCIL COMMENCE HYDR

Sir Adam Beck Outlines He Asks for

A request to proceed with the construction and the operation of the proposed hydro electric railway from Toronto to London through this city will be made of the Hydro Electric Power Commission. The City Council at the mid-monthly session last evening passed a resolution empowering the Mayor and Clerk to sign the agreement which was voted on by the Hydro Power Commission to proceed with the work.

Sir Adam Beck, the chairman of the Commission, was present and outlined the plans and prospects. He was enthusiastically received and his information was of assistance to the Commission which they had received earlier in the day to sign the agreement to which the electors of the city have already given their assent.

Sir Adam among other things said: "Mr. Mayor, I am not here to urge any action upon you in regard to the matter of electric railways, that matter is a fact, settled by the electors several years ago when they voted by a big majority for the hydro radial railway-by-law. It is not necessary for me to come to Kitchener to do anything where such a large vote for the by-law was given. Now why was no action been taken with the construction of the railway? You remember the Hydro Railway Act was amended and a clause inserted which stipulated that there was to be no construction while the war was on for all our men and money were required to prosecute the war and so, of course, we did not expend any money on surveys, nor completing surveys nor the promoting nor the carrying on of the work in general.

"You are probably aware of the fact that we are now free to construct lines as we had planned, after being held up between Toronto and the Falls because Hamilton which undertook to assume the largest burden, \$5,000,000 when they voted on it defeated the by-law to assume their share of the line between Toronto, Port Credit and the Falls. Hamilton, which was the crux of the whole plan, however, resubmitted the by-law and strange to say after the defeat it was carried on this occasion by a 2 to 1 vote. This was necessary to make it a feasible scheme was carried on now build and get a connecting link with Buffalo, thus connecting two cities of 500,000 population each. We will not only have a public owned system but we will have a modern electric line, of the highest type and class, surpassing all others except perhaps the New York Central.

GERMAN DELEGATES RETURN TO WEIMAR WITH PEACE TERMS

Consultation With Government to be Held Tuesday.

ARMISTICE TERMINATED
BERLIN, June 17.—Berlin was advised by telephone last evening that Count von Brockdorff-Rantzau had received the allied reply to the German counter proposals and would leave for Weimar at 8 o'clock.

The news that the entente has replied to Germany was made public here late in the evening. The delegates are due to arrive in Weimar on Tuesday afternoon. The minor members of the delegation and expert advisers will come to this city direct from Versailles.

PARIS, June 17.—If Germany refuses to sign the peace treaty, allied armies will immediately launch one of the greatest and most decisive campaigns in history. While the public is generally inclined to the idea of an advance into Germany and present conditions are little more than a triumphal parade, in which no assistance will be met, Marshal Foch has been obliged to be prepared for any emergency. The allies would move forward with every detail worked out for a campaign extending from the Dutch to Swiss frontiers designed to deliver a heavy blow the shortest possible time and with the maximum force which unified-
