portance he filled in the colony. The introduction arose from a circumstance that fortunately displayed the exalted mind of the young merchant, and gave indelible proof that nature designed him for no unimportant condition of life.

With true admiration of his integrity and amiable qualities, his noble friend felt a zealous desire to be the means of promoting his views in whatever way they might be desired; -and soon learning his ardent wish to become a soldier, delayed not in exerting every possible interest to procure him a low commission. He fortunately succeeded; and Arthur was appointed to a regigiment then stationed in the West Indies. On receiving the confirmation of the success of his application, the commander in chief, (for such was the rank of Arthur's friend,) sent for the young soldier and presenting him with his commission observed " perhaps this is one of the most happy moments of my life, for I have the double pleasure of knowing, that while I am gratifying the laudable wishes of an amiable young man, I am adding to his Majesty's Army, an officer whose honor and integrity will never be excelled-go my friend-may your valour equal these distinguished qualities of your private life; and may you reap in the field laurals which your virtues richly merit."
