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Doleman wins prestigious scholarship

Brett Doleman, a 1994 science graduate of the University of New Brunswick, has been awarded the Dr. Gilbert and Agnes Tumer Scholarship for 1995-96. Established by the late Dr. Gilbert Turner, a UNB alumnus, the Dr. Gilbert and Agnes Tumer Scholarship is valued

It is awarded annually to assist a worthy candidate in the pursuit of a graduate degree at a university approved by UNB. Doleman, a Fredericton resident, is currently working on his doctorate in chemical physics at the California Institute of Technology. He expects to complete his degree in five years. His work focuses on one aspect of environmental pollution, the depletion of the ozone layer by airborne pollutants.

This is critical, he notes, because the ozone layer is our weakened shield against cancer-causing ultraviolet radiation. His study involves the use of high-tech, ultra-fast, femto-second pulse lasers to study the chemical reactions between ozone and various pollutants. The long-term goal is to understand these reactions, so as to recommend ways of preventing the depletion of our planet's ozone layer.

Detect prostate cancer early

Did you know that prostate cancer is the most common type of cancer found in Canadian men. Well it is.

It is estimated that in 1995, 16,100 men will be diagnosed with prostate cancer. While prostate problems occur in nearly half of all Canadian men over the age of 40, more often than not, the problems are caused by medical conditions other than cancer.

The best way to detect prostate cancer early is to have a rectal exam as part of a regular checkup. Many times growths on the prostate gland can be found before symptoms develop. If the growth is cancer, treatment can begin before the cancer cells have a chance Most prostate problems however, are to Healthy Eating: not cancer. It takes an examination by a physician to tell the difference.

A blood test for Prostate Specific Antigen (PSA) has been shown to be useful in planning the treatment of prostate cancer. Its role in early diagnosis is not clear, therefore the use of the PSA test as a method of screening for prostate cancer is currently under

The cause of prostate cancer is not known. Recent studies indicate that diet may be associated with the development of prostate cancer. The Canadian Cancer Society recommends that men aged 50 and over visit their physician regularly for a digital rectal

to spread to other parts of the body. exam and follow Canada's Guidelines

Many prostate problems share the same symptoms. The problem may be caused by a benign enlargement of the gland, bacterial infection or cancer. If any of the following symptoms occur, you might want to contact a physician at the Health Centre on Campus to determine the cause:

Frequent, difficult or painful urination. Dribbling urine. Blood or pus in the urine. Pain in the lower back, pelvic area or upper thighs. Painful ejaculation.
