

- Q. 53 - The seventh charge when in confinement escaping on the 13th day of November, would you tell the court how you escaped in this instance. Is it for the same reasons as before?
- A. 53 - Yes, it is
- Q. 54 - When were you picked up in this instance?
- A. 54 - I left the detention room about 6.30 and I was picked up at 6.30 in the evening
- Q. 55 - Where?
- A. 55 - In the N.A.A.F.I.
- Q. 56 - Did you leave New Martinique barracks during the day?
- A. 56 - No sir, I never

Cross-examination by Prosecutor

- Q. 57 - Pte. Barnard, when did you first feel sick on the morning of the 16th of October?
- A. 57 - Just after I woke up, sir, I felt sick.
- Q. 58 - At what time was the No. 1 Holding Unit medical parade?
- A. 58 - 6.15 sir
- Q. 59 - If you felt sick when you woke up why didn't you report on the sick parade?
- A. 59 - It was already gone.
- Q. 60 - Were you late answering reveille?
- A. 60 - Yes sir
- Q. 61 - So you started out the day wrong in being late in answering the reveille call?
- A. 61 - Yes sir
- Q. 62 - Then about 7 o'clock you told us you went to the orderly room. Did you see Cpl. Carter then?
- A. 62 - Yes sir
- Q. 63 - Did you explain to him what you were doing?
- A. 63 - Yes sir
- Q. 64 - When did he warn you for the guard mounting? On that occasion or later?
- A. 64 - Later on sir
- Q. 65 - Just about what time of day was it he warned you for guard mounting?
- A. 65 - The same time as he warned me to go on parade at 9.30.
- Q. 66 - What was your trouble?
- A. 66 - I felt ill.
- Q. 67 - In what way?
- A. 67 - I was sick at my stomach and had a slight fever.
- Q. 68 - What duties were you for for that day besides guard mounting?
- A. 68b - None that I know of sir.
- Q. 69 - What means did you take to relieve your illness?
- A. 69 - I had no means sir except I went into the drying room so I would not catch cold.
- Q. 70 - And at 10 o'clock at night you felt sufficiently well to leave the barracks. When did you leave barracks?
- A. 70 - Between 10 and 11.
- Q. 71 - You were all right then were you?
- A. 71 - No sir
- Q. 72 - Where did you go?
- A. 72 - Over to another drying room sir.
- Q. 73 - You were missing for 14 days
- A. 73 - That was on this day I went in the other drying room and some of the fellows there from my platoon came and told me that Cpl. Carter was going to put me under arrest.
- Q. 74 - Yes, we heard that. But at 10 o'clock at night you were able to leave barracks. You had recovered that much?
- A. 74 - Yes sir
- Q. 75 - Were you afraid the M. O. would find you not ill around 10 o'clock at night?
- A. 75 - I still had a fever sir and if he took my temperature he would find out I was ill.
- Q. 76 - And yet, notwithstanding that you left?
- A. 76 - Yes sir
- Q. 77 - That was on the 16th Oct. 14 days later on the 30th October you were dressed in civilian clothes and I think you said it was to go out with some civilian. Why didn't you continue to wear your uniform?
- A. 77 - I just changed for the novelty sir.
