Pope Leo XIII Passed Peacefully Away at 4.04 This Afternoon.

End was Expected all Day Cardinal Vannutelli said Prayers for the Dying

Special to The Planet. Rome, July 20.-His Holiness Pope Leo passed away at 4.04 this after-

Rome, July 20, 2.45 p. m.-The Pope has entered into what the doctors believe to be his last agony. The death rattle is audible to those waiting outside the sick room.

Dr. Mazzoni, on leaving the sick chamber a few moments ago, said the present indications pointed to the Pope's death within two hours.

Rome, July 20, 1.50 p. m .- Dr. Mazconi has been hastily recalled to the Vatican. It is believed the supreme moment is very near.

At 12.35 p. m. information came from the Vatican that it is scared the Pope's last moment is fast approaching. All the cardinals have been summoned to the Vatican.

After his first visit to the Pope this morning. Dr. Mazzoni went to see Cardinal Rampolla and had a conference with him which lasted a half

The following medical bulletin was sued at 9.35 a. m.: During the night the Holy Father

rested only at short intervals. His general condition remains grave. Pulse, 94; respiration, 32; temperature, 36.2 centigrade. (Signed)

LAPPONI. MAZZONI.

While the doctors were examining their patient this morning, believing him to be in a stupor, His Holiness suddenly fixed his eyes, even now bright and by no means lifeless, on them, saying:

"This time, doctors, you will not win in your brave fight with death."
"It is your holiness who is brave," replied Dr. Lapponi, but before the remark was uttered the Pope was again unable to understand what was said.

NEWS IN CHATHAM. Word was received, via C. P. R.

elegraph, in the city to-day at 12.30 of the decease of Pope Leo XIII. at Rome, and it was but a short time before the bells of both Ursuline Academy charpel and St. Joseph's church were pealing forth the sad, but not altogether unexpected, intelligence.

The Academy chapel bell toled 94 times, the number of years of the life of the late Pope. The corridors and chapel of the Academy have been and chapel of the Academy have been draped in black and "vespers for the dead" will be held this evening. To-morrow morning high mass, the requiem, will be held at seven o'clock. At St. Joseph's church the bell was toled, but what the services will be will not be known until advices arrive from Bishop McEvoy, of this, London Diocese. There is no doubt but that the special services will be begun to-morrow morning.


