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#### Odd Origin of Sea Terms.

How many people imagine that that familiar word "admiral" is anything but a thorough English word? Probably the last origin any would give it is Eastern. Yet its derivation is simply "Emir el Bagh," which is Arabic for Lord of the Sea.

There is hardly a language that we have not put under contribution for seaterms. The names of the various officers of a ship illustrate this most vividly. Nowadays we talk of "port'and "starboard." Originally it was "larboard" and "starboard." Starboard has nothing to do with stars. It is really "steor board." Anglo-Saxon for "steer side," because in old galleys steered by an oar the oar was fixed somewhat to the righthand side of the stern, and the helmsman held the inboard portion in his righthand. As for "larboard," it is probeably a corruption of lower board, the larboard side being originally considered inferior to the other.

Again, "jury mast" has nothing directly to do with a law court jury, though both have come from the same original word, "jour," the French for day. Jury mast thus means a mast put up temporarily—for a day—just as jury in the legal term implies a tribunal summoned for a short period only.

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### PEARY, POLE SEEKER

ARCTIC EXPLORER WHO WILL AGAIN TRY TO REACH THE POLE.

Plans of Mis Coming Expedition to the North-Will Establish Headquarters at Grantland-The Snew Baby-Matthew Hansen's Pluck-Only Men of Tried Experience to Be Taken.

Commander Robert E. Peary, U.S.N., who has announced his intention of making another attempt to reach the North Pole, has already made six trips to the frozen north and has spent over twelve years al' together in the Arctic regions, Explorer Peary will start on his seventh polar expedition next summer,

th polar expedition next summer, having been granted three years' leave of absence by the United States Navy Department for that purpose. When Mr. Peary returned from his last trip to the north it was decided that his wife should accompany him if he decided to make another trial. The recent birth of a son has upset that plan, and Mrs. Peary will remain at heme. She, however, continues to believe that the discovery of the North Pole should be made by her husband, who has already spent her husband, who has already spent many of the best years of his life in

It was during the expedition of 1893 that Marie Ahnighite Peary, "the snow baby," was born. Her father and mother were living in Anniversary Lodge, north of Greenland, in 77 degrees 40 minutes north latitude, when the little one came into existence. This was on Sept. 12, 1893. The baby's first six months were spent in the lamplight, but later, when the long night of the Arctic er, when the long night of the Arctic winter was over, she lived constantly

er, when the long night of the Arctic winter was over, she lived constantly in the uninterrupted sunshine and grew with great rapidity.

The snow baby was the wonder of the Eskimos, who traveled long distances to see her. They could not believe that she was not made of snow until they had touched her. A little suit of furs were made for her by an Eskimo woman named Ahnighite, so when the baby was christened she, too, was called Ahnighite.

Early next July Commander Peary expects to start for the north with a swift ship and a first-class crew. His plan is to establish winter quarters on the north shore of Grantland, where only 420 nautical miles will stretch between him and the pole.

"I have already demonstrated," said Commander Peary recently, "that I can travel more than twice that distance over the Arctic ice. But the trouble has been previously

that distance over the Arctic ice. But the trouble has been previously But the trouble has been previously that I did not have a ship that could take me there in time. That is all I need now. The rest of the problem has been worked out in prac-

'If I can get the right kind of "If I can get the right kind of a ship—and if I get the money I know where I can get the ship—I can sail on July 1 and get to Cape Sabine by the end of the month. I can stay there until September, gathering walrus meat, native helpers, dogs and whatever else I need. I can winter on the shore of Grantland and have everything ready to start for the Pole at the first return of Arctic daylight in February. That would give me 100 to 110 days to reach the Pole and get back. All I ask is a ship that will take me the 350 miles that lie between Cape Sabine and Grantland. I know I can reach the Pole from that point."

He is forty-seven years old, yet walks with the spring of youth not-withstanding that he is minus seven toes that were frozen off during one of his journeys.

In his final attempt to reach the Pole the explorer will take with him enly men of tried experience in Arctic work. Eskimos will form the principal members of his sled dash. On man has already been selected, Matthew Hansen, who has been with Peary on all his expeditions. Hansen is a mulatto, born in Maryland. He has shown wonderful grit under most. trying conditions and endurance equal to that of Peary himself. On the last expedition, when all the others quit. Hansen kept on the march, and when Peary's feet were frozen almost solid Hansen cared for him and took him into camp. Funds for the coming expedition to the amount of \$150,000 are expected from the Peary Arctic club of New York.
