The Toronto Globe, the chief mouth ce of the Government and Sir Wilfrid Laurier's most trusted organ, declares editorially that it is in the best ests of Canadian industries that steel rails, which sell in the United States at \$28 per ton, should be per mitted to be slaughtered in Canada for \$18 per ton. In the same issue, in its news columns, the Globe state that the United States Steel Trust hopes to secure orders for 100,000 tons of rails in Canada this year. The Liberal party is thus placed on record as believing that it is proper to wp steel works at Sydney and Sault Ste. Marie, and allow American workmen to supply our markets. The course, to the wire mills, binder twine factories and woollen mills which are being ruined by outside competition "Board up the windows" says the Globe, "send our people abroad to work in American factories and finish Canadian raw material, send abroad our gold to pay for the finished product, and build up Canada." That is the platform from which Sir Wilfrid and his followers evidently intend to appeal to the electorate in the near future. The Globe has sounded a timely warning by calling attention to the attitude the Government will assume towards Canadian industrice and Canadian labor. Every elector who believes in Canada's future should vote to prevent Canadian market from being swamped by foreign goods in the manner set forth by the Globe.
