AMERICAN SHOT AT NIAGARA BY CANADIAN WHO WAS ON GUARD

[By Special Wire to the Courier] BUFFALO, Dec. 28.—One American was instantly killed and another seriously wounded by Canadian troops patrolling the Canadian border at Port Erie, Ont., opposite this city, to-day. The men were hunting ducks over of season in the Niagara river and in Canadian waters. Provincial Police Officer Thomas Delaney of Port Erie ordered the men to stop shooting when they heard a shot. Delaney called upon a corporal and two privates of the 44th battalion of the Canadian militia for assistance. The corporal ordered the men to come ashore. Instead they headed their boat for the American shore and were beating a hasty retreat, when at the order of Delaney the soldiers fired upon them. One of the men, Walter Smith, was killed through the head. His companion, Charles Dorsch, suffered a serious wound in the shoulder. When the hunters tumbled over in their boat toward the hunters' craft to shore, both men resumed in Buffalo.

Captain Norman Fite, in charge of the border patrol at Port Erie, declined to discuss the matter further than to say that he had reported the shooting to his commanding officer at Toronto.

WAR STORIES FROM FRONT

THE COUNTY REGIMENTS FINE WORK AT THE FRONT. (A major of the R.F.A. writes, praising the work of the English county regiments):

This is a curious and unpleasant form of warfare, as regards the front line, and each army always seems too small for its task, and I agree with Sir John French that no other troops in the world would endure as our do. Meanwhile, we cannot make out the German game. He has lost thousands in these futile attacks along our line, but never seems to boil up a good assault anywhere. We all admire the 19th Saxon Corps, better men far than the vaunted Iron Corps or the Grand Corps; but they must have used up even their impetus by now. I think the officers are filled with a craving for military glory, and each new lot that comes in to reap imperishable honor at the expense of the English.

The infantry have the worst of it now—cramped and wet and cold in the trenches, one day out there eight spent in collecting wire, carrying rations, digging trenches, etc.—but Thomas Atkins is gitted with the power of endless sleep, no matter what the conditions may be.

As usual, the English county regiments are doing the best—they and the Guards. They all look pretty miserable sights, permanent cover in mud, their rifles the only clean thing about them. All honor be to them! Their endurance these last ten days makes my heart beat when I think of it.

HEAVY BATTLE WAS FOUGHT CHRISTMAS EVE

[By Special Wire to the Courier] LONDON, Dec. 28.—The Daily News publishes the following despatch dated Northern France, Dec. 26: "Le Fete de Noel has ended here in a blazing fireworks display. At 2 o'clock this morning I was on the coast many miles away from the battle line. It was intensely cold, a night of steel stars glimmering in an ice blue sky. At such a time sound travels extraordinarily distances. From far away came the sharp yip of the foxes, now and again the owlish hoot of a steamer, crawling frightfully close to the shoals marking the coast line, and then there suddenly came the hunters' craft tremendous thud and echo of a big gun at sea answering the snarl of land artillery. It all merged at length into the din of conflict, so familiar to us now that we take no notice of it.

"The battering and hammering came from the harried terrain north of Nieuport, a more than usually fierce renewal of that eternal battle and staking of the straits of outdistance in matter of duration and boredom, the swaying conflicts of Greece and Troy. A calm night, a sea calm, and a biting frost, united to make a particularly favorable setting after the feast and flow of Christmas Day. It was good for digestion, perhaps, but no salve for raw nerves. The fighting I have learned later was fast, furious and bloody.

"All the German soldiers, who could be spared spent the morning in devotional exercises and sang yuletide chants and carols, the strains of which could be heard quite clearly by the others across the flooded Yser. Then set out with more foolishness than courage, to make a night of it. The whole business ended in shambling. Such at least, was the effect of the story brought here at sunset this evening by French postmen, whose light armored cars dash through the rain, the weather having suddenly changed from ice to tears, with their belated messages of peace and good will from the front. The tale they told was of a very heavy slaughter.

"This evening the long hospital train of wounded French and Belgians and one or two Germans came to the siding by the hospital clearing house. These wounded told the same tale of tempestuous fighting, a very determined recrudescence of hostilities on both sides.

"More men have been flung into the lines, and a continuation of hot and heavy work in the northern sector is assured, he allies are vigorously pressing forward, full of energy, and there has been a lot of aeroplane fawning and sweeping in the clouds."

SIX BATTALIONS, BESIDES PRINCESS PATS, TO BE UTILIZED AS REINFORCEMENTS.

OTTAWA, Dec. 28.—Contrary to previous arrangements, the second contingent from Canada will comprise a complete army division. It was at first discussed the four of the infantry battalions at Salisbury, which are aver and above the strength of a full division, would be taken to form the nucleus of the second Canadian division. This arrangement has been abandoned.

Twelve of the eighteen battalions at Salisbury have been included in the first division, leaving a surplus of six. These are the 6th Battalion, the 9th, the 11th, the 12th and the 17th. In addition there is Princess Patricia's regiment, which has been brigaded with a British division, commanded by General O'Donnell, and is now in France. The 6th Battalion is composed completely of former cavalrymen, including the Port Garry Horse, the 18th Mounted Rifles and other units. These men, who joined the infantry in the hope of ultimately being allowed to go mounted, are so have their desire satisfied, for they are to be used as reinforcements for the Strathcona's, the Royal Canadian Dragoons and the divisional cavalry.

The 9th, 11th, 12th and 17th, are to be utilized for the purpose of providing infantry reinforcements. It would appear from the above that it is intended to send the remainder of the division to the front at an early date. On account of first re-arrangement a larger number than first expected will be required for the second division, which will be re-organized as follows:

Fourth Infantry Brigade—18th Battalion, London; 19th and 20th, Toronto; 21st Kingston.

Fifth Infantry Brigade—22nd French-Canadian Battalion, St. Jean, Quebec; 24th, Montreal; 25th, Halifax; 26th, St. John, N.B.

Sixth Infantry Brigade—27th and 28th Winnipeg; 29th, Vancouver; 31st Calgary.

The 23rd, Quebec, may be included in the Fifth Brigade.
