TELL IT TO THE MARINES

A polite paragraph in The News recently advised the Kaiser to convey certain information to the Horse Marines. The full flavor of this may not be apparent to those who are not posted on mid-Victorian humor; and indeed it is not obvious why jokes should be made at the expense of the Marines at all. Kipling has described them as "Soldier and Sailor too"—which is now correct: "For there isn't a job on the top of the earth the beggar don't know, nor do—"
"E's a sort o' bloomin' cosmopolite—soldier and sailor, too." Also "They think for themselves, and they steal for themselves, and they never ask what's to do."

Not all the sort to be easily taken in and done for. Why then, should unbelievable stories be consigned to the Marines. There is the whole history of the British Navy back of this, and we may as well begin with Alfred the Great.

FROM THE BEGINNING

In Alfred's time, and before, the English Coasts and also those of Scotland were frequently ravaged by the hardy Norsemen, the picturesque but really Vikings, who indulged in regular excursions, seeking for which Alfred accordingly got together a number of small ships, which, if not always in commission, could be manned on short notice, and which would at least delay the landing of the northern plunderers until a suitable reception could be prepared for them. Strange to say, this primitive naval policy suffered little change for hundreds of years. For coast defence, the King hired, purchased or annexed any ships he could get, and put some first-class fighting men aboard. It was hand-to-hand fighting in any case. All through the Middle Ages, there was so little division between commerce and piracy that all ships went armed and the curious high bows and sterns were simply fighting platforms. The forecastle was a real castle—ships closed and hammered it out, blow for blow. When America was discovered, primitive cannon of about yacht size were in use. Fired at a hundred yards range they were effective against light woodwork.

SOLDIERS AND SAILORS

The Navy, then, always had its fighting traditions, but the distinctive military element of a King's ship was red-coated and smelt of the barracks and the parade-ground. There was a crew of sailors to handle the ship, under a master and mates; but the military element was a company under a captain.
As the use of ordnance grew naval tactics changed. The castled ends were pared down, for they offered too great targets for shot. Actions began at what was considered long range, that is a few hundred yards; each sought to wing his enemy, and having rendered him unmanageable to pour in a few broadsides, and finish the job by boarding. As soon became apparent that naval gunnery was a sailor's job, rather than a soldier's; all the tackle for moving and pointing muzzle-loaders was sailor's tackle, and who but a seaman could work to advantage a long range gun. The business of manoeuvring the ship into action called for the highest skill in seamanship. The sailor-master became a captain, holding the King's commission, and his mates became lieutenants. As a fighting machine the ship no longer relied on the red-coated, military element.

BORDEN CONFERS WITH THE BRITISH COALITION CABINET

London, July 15.—Sir Robert L. Borden, the Canadian Premier, attended yesterday's meeting of the Cabinet. This is in line with the policy announced by the Dominion Government of consulting the Dominion Governments on the steps being taken to prosecute the war and the promise that the dominions would be heard on all matters concerning the Empire.

The Prime Minister of Canada yesterday was in conference with the War Office in respect to the supplies Canada could furnish for the purpose of the war. It is understood the conference will be continued to-day or Friday. Sir Robert Borden has found officials of the War Office most desirous of purchasing in Canada, so far as possible, such supplies as can be furnished in the Dominion.

The Prime Minister has also conferred with the Admiralty respecting more effective arrangements for transport in North Atlantic trade and for the Pacific as well. This matter will probably be made the subject of a memorandum, in which the situation that has to be met will be set forth in detail. The needs of the trade between the British Isles and Canada were strongly emphasized by the Prime Minister, who was accompanied by Sir George Perley and Mr. R. B. Bennett.
