THE PROBS

Toronto, Jan. 18.—The disturbance which was over the Gulf of St. Lawrence yesterday has moved out to the Atlantic and another has come into the lake region from the northward. Snow falls have occurred in the Maritime Provinces and the Georgian Bay region; but the weather over the Dominion has been for the most part fair and cold.

AN OFFICIAL ANNOUNCEMENT

Is Made With Regard to the Capitulation of Montenegro.

Amsterdam, via London, Jan. 18.—A despatch from Berlin says that an official announcement was made yesterday in the Prussian diet before its adjournment of the capitulation of the government of Montenegro. The news was hailed by those present with enthusiastic applause.

POSITION MORE REASSURING REGARDING ALBANIA.

London, Jan. 18.—The news of the capitulation of the government of Montenegro, arrived here too late for editorial comment in the morning newspapers. In giving the news, however, the press generally explains that the event was not unexpected as a consequence of the crushing of Serbia.

Despatches from Rome are of a more reassuring character, from the viewpoint of the allies, with regard to the position of Albania. They state that the latter country is now detested with active forces and that Italy in this way has taken proper measures for safeguarding the future prospects of the kingdom of Montenegro. It is added that the occupation by French troops of the island of Corfu secures for the allies a naval base of the greatest value as the island is regarded by many military experts as the key of the Adriatic and as a position of great value for the purpose of landing troops in Albania.

At the Martinmas hirings in Dumbarton, the weekly wages, plus free house and the usual allowances, were on the average about 30s 6d for first ploughmen, and 28s 6d for ordinary ploughmen and byemen, while boys were being engaged at £15 for the half-year, with board; in the western part of the county shepherds and ploughmen staying on in their places are getting a war bonus of £2 and £3 respectively in the half-year.

MANY DENTISTS

Are to be Employed With the French Forces.

Paris, Jan. 16.—The Minister of War will shortly submit to the Chamber of Deputies a bill providing for a large addition in the number of dentists employed with the military forces. Under the bill a body of 1,000 dentists, who will rank as non-commissioned officers and wear a special badge, will be created.

SPLENDID RALLY

Is Held by Baptist Young Peoples Societies.

A splendid rally of the Baptist Young Peoples' Societies of the city was held last evening in Park Baptist Church. Notwithstanding the unfavorable weather, each society was well represented.

Mr. Ernest Heatley, president of the City Union occupied the chair in a very able manner. A bright series of song preceded the meeting.

Mr. Heatley in a few well chosen words introduced the speaker of the evening, Rev. Dr. W. T. Graham, of Toronto, who is no stranger to the people of Brantford.

Dr. Graham based his remarks on Matt. xvi. 13-28. He dealt with the deity of Christ, basing his talk on the following headings: Whom do men say that I am? What does the church say? What does the individual say? The speaker dealt with facts which the Bible teaches.

The beauty of the human life of Christ argued for his deity. His perfect human character was shown in the four gospels. Christ had no outstanding character vices. All his virtues blended in making the only perfect character in history. He was the only universal man of history. There was nothing local in his character. He had all the essentials of humanity. He thought and taught universally so, making it possible for his religion to be a universal one. His teachings met all legitimate needs of humanity in all countries and all great humanity never shall outgrow them.

His perfect character argues for his deity. He prayed for others, but never acknowledged sin himself. He always did the will of the Father who sent him. His claims argue for his deity. Before "Abraham was I am," "I and the Father are one." He claimed the right to judge the world and to forgive sin. He did the works of God in healing and restoring life. It is impossible for the story of his life to be an invention, as the records of four separate men correspond.

The four gospels," said the speaker, "are the supreme gem in all the writings of men."

Dr. Graham dealt with the extent of the influence of the gospel of Christ and the intent and quality of the influence. He spoke of the power of the gospel, saying that all wars and troubles on earth, break down hills, fill the valleys and so make a great highway for Christ's triumphal march through the world.

He closed by speaking of the authority of Christ. To know Christ, we must trust Him. Only those who have the Christ life can understand His majesty and beauty. Millions of the best people of all ages have put Christ to the test and proved Him.

All who attended the service last evening were much impressed by the clear, forceful and masterly way in which the subject was presented by Dr. Graham. During the evening Mr. Norton Buck and Miss K. Kavanagh rendered very pleasing solos. Mrs. J. Schultz presided at the organ. Last evening's meeting was indicative of the high standard of Christian service which is set before the Baptist Young Peoples' Societies of the city.
