## PRESUMPTION IS THAT GENERAL MERCER IS DEAD

Went Into Armagh Wood Alone, and Probably Never Emerged.

### HABIT OF GOING ABOUT ALONE

Secretary Lansing Cables Berlin, Who Reply He is Not a Prisoner.

London, June 22.—The following details of the last seen of General Mercer are supplied by a perfectly reliable authority: General Mercer and Williams with their A.D.C.'s and Lieuts. Gooderham and Fraser reached the front line of the Canadians, east of Ypres, just before the bombardment commenced, having come up from the maple cone to battalion headquarters of the 4th Canadian Mounted Rifles, near Armagh Wood, immediately behind trench '51 during heavy shelling.

When the bombardment commenced shortly after 9 o'clock on the morning of June 2, apparently Gen. Mercer went into the battalion headquarters' dugout with Maj. Denison, together with two A.D.C.'s.

General Williams, who was reported slightly wounded in the face, went into the trench called the "tunnel," slightly to the northeast of this headquarters dugout, and running into a still deeper trench known as the "tube." General Williams was accompanied by Major Denison and a considerable number of the men took refuge in the "tunnel." During the bombardment the "tunnel" was blocked at least once. The men inside were nearly suffocated before it was possible to dig a way out again.

Men in Tunnel Taken.

When the bombardment ceased the Germans rushed across before word could be given to the men in the tunnel and apparently all inside were captured. This would account for the general mentioned in the German communiqué.

It is thought that Gen. Mercer stayed in the headquarters dugout for a considerable time, and that in the afternoon he started to walk back in the direction of the maple cone through Armagh wood, Young Gooderham, who was wounded in the leg and Fraser, who was un wounded, were last seen in a shell hole, not far distant from the battalion headquarters' dugout.

General Mercer was seen to stride away like this and leave his A.D.C.'s to follow after him. On this occasion he apparently got away from them, but whether he had been since seen.

It was said that he had been rendered stone deaf, but whether as a result of a blow or merely from the shock of the shelling, it is not clear. It is presumed that he must have been killed and his body is probably lying yet out in Armagh wood.

Not a Prisoner.

Washington, June 22.—At the request of the Canadian authorities Secretary of State Lansing cabled to Ambassador Gerard at Berlin to ascertain from the German War Office particulars available with respect to Major-General Mercer, of the Third Canadian division, who was thought to be a prisoner of war in Germany. Secretary Lansing yesterday received a reply from Ambassador Gerard stating that enquiry had been made by the German authorities and that General Mercer is not in any of the prison camps.

### CRIME COMMITTED LAST DECEMBER, TWO DAYS AFTER CHRISTMAS

By Special Wire to the Courier.

St. Hyacinthe, June 21.—The trial of Policarpe Paradis, of St. Germain, charged with the murder of Francois Frechette, a farmer, of the same place, was opened here yesterday before Judge Martineau, the criminal block and crown being represented by V. E. Fontaine, and the counsel for the defence being Lucien Gendron, of St. Hyacinthe.

The crime with which Paradis is charged, was committed on December 27 last at the home of Frechette, about two miles from the village of St. Germain. Paradis, together with Armand Piche, a young man from Montreal, had been at the Frechette home during the afternoon. They had been drinking with Frechette and trouble ensued. It is said, as a result of Paradis insulting one of Frechette's daughters. In the scuffle, Frechette is said to have struck Paradis on the head with a hatchet. Paradis then drove away to the home of Paradis' mother, about a quarter of a mile away.

Some time later they came back and Frechette was called out of the house by Paradis, the other members of the family having retired for the night. Frechette was shot when he went out to the sleigh occupied by Paradis and Piche.

Paradis was arrested early the next morning by Constable Roy of St. Germain. Paradis was found in his possession, and he admitted having done the shooting.

Piche's testimony yesterday consisted of a story of the events leading up to the shooting. He said that words had ensued between the two men after Frechette had been called from his house, and that Frechette had grasped Paradis' shoulder before the gun was fired. This is accepted by the defence as a strengthening of their case. They contend that the shooting might have been accidental.

## SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within five miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A suitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$1.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 80 acre extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchase homestead in certain districts. Price \$2.00 per acre.

Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$200.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of crop, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be submitted for cultivation under certain conditions.

## FORTY-FIFTH YEAR

## PERSHING SENDS ON THE FIGHT THE MEXICAN SURVIVORS OF THE INTO THE AMBU HEARD FROM— IN WASHINGTON AVERTED.

By Special Wire to the Courier.

Washington, June 22.—A preliminary report from General Pershing on the Carrizal fight, based on reports by stragglers reaching headquarters of the American expedition, and on Mexican rumors, taken to the White House early day by Secretary of War Baker.

Not an Official Report.

The secretary said General Pershing himself did not regard the report as an official statement of what had happened, and indicated that attempt to decide the course to be pursued by the United States would be made until a complete account had been received. In the meantime the preliminary report will not be made public, although it is understood to be substantially in accordance with the version given in both press despatches.

Nothing from Survivors.

Officials are greatly worried of the delay in getting news from surviving officers of the tenth cavalry detachment which engaged a force of Mexicans. According to Mexican official accounts there were about seventy six Americans, seventeen of whom were taken prisoners, Capt. Charles Boyd, Lieut. Henry R. Adams and ten men are said to have been killed. Of the remaining 47, a few stragglers are reported to have reached the Carrizal headquarters yesterday and to-day there had been no word from the two cavalry troops sent to get in touch with the command. General Pershing said he hoped to have a report from surviving officers by courier during the day.

Nothing New.

Senator Newland, chairman of the foreign relations committee called the state department early today to get a report from Secretary Lansing. There had been no new developments. Mr. Stone said congress would do nothing in the crisis that might result from negotiations between the state department and the Mexican government.

Hope for No War.

"Hope persisted among officials here today that war against Mexico would not become necessary. Gen. Pershing's report from the Carrizal front may show a similar attitude, and will seek to avert the threat of a break.

The outlook was far from bright, however, and orders had been sent for transportation of ten thousand national guardsmen to border from central and western states as soon as they are ready for service.
