Are Desirous of Securing Recruits in Brantford

Major Anthes, of the Canadian Engineers, arrived in the city accompanied by Lieut. Mallory, also of the Engineers, for the purpose of securing recruits for that branch of the overseas service.

The men they are looking for include carpenters, bricklayers, steam fitters, plumbers, electricians, and practically every other trade.

The pay is the same as in other branches of the service.

A recruiting depot will be opened here next week when men will be attested. They will mobilize in Toronto, and will then be sent to St. John's, Quebec, where they complete their training. The latter does not take more than three months, and drafts are sent overseas monthly.

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DISAVOWAL OF THE SINKING

Of Hospital Ship Britannic Is Made By Germany.

London, Nov. 24.—A virtual disavowal that a German submarine had anything to do with the British hospital ship Britannic in the Aegean Sea is contained in a wireless despatch received today from Berlin which reads as follows:

"According to the reports so far at hand the Britannic was proceeding from England to Saloniki. For a journey in this direction the large number of persons on board was extraordinary striking and justified a stronger suspicion of the misuse of a hospital ship for transport purposes.

"Inasmuch as the ship bore the distinguishing marks of a hospital ship in accordance with regulations, there can naturally be no question of a German submarine being connected with the sinking."

Washington, Nov. 24.—Revival of sensational rumors of recall of ruthless submarine warfare by Germany and consequent action by the United States were met today by the statement of officials that the situation while delicate, was absolutely unchanged and would be until the United States had gathered all the evidence on recent attacks.

The state department still is waiting the result of investigation and meanwhile officials reiterate that the position of the United States as laid down in the last correspondence with Germany is unchanged. It made clear that a severance of diplomatic relations would follow any violation of the pledges.

HUNGARIAN DUKE IN COMMAND.

Berlin, Nov. 23.—(Via Sayville to the Associated Press, Nov. 24.)—Archduke Joseph, holding the rank of colonel-general in the Austrian army, has assumed command of the section of the eastern battle front formerly commanded by the reg. Emperor Charles. Joseph is called the "Hungarian archduke", having chosen Hungary as his residence. Heretofore he has commanded an army corps with success.

Archduke Joseph should not be confused with Archduke Joseph Ferdinand, who formerly commanded an army in Volhynia.

Archduke Joseph, the new commander of the southern section of the eastern front, was born at Altmunich in 1872. In 1893 he married at Munich Princess Augustine of Bavaria. Up to recently he was commander of the Austrian seventh army corps.



CARRANZISTAS LOSE A GENERAL

100 Men Killed In Battle With Villa's Forces.

Chihuahua City, Mex. Nov. 24.—via El Paso Junction.—(Passed by military censor)—One general, two colonels and 100 men of the Carranza forces were killed during the fighting to-day between Carranza troops and Villa bandits. Four hundred men of the Villa command are known to have been killed and left on the battlefield.

George Melbourne, 18 years old, of Cedar Springs, Mich., was fatally shot by Mrs. Ida Wilson, with whom he was hunting. The woman shot at a rabbit and hit young Melbourne, who died four hours later.

INDIANS FIRST IN SOMME FIGHT

An eloquent appeal was delivered at Victoria Hall last night on the part of the women of India by Miss Turner, the secretary of the Zenana Mission which has been conducting the work of assistance in that country for the past sixty-five years.

The lecture was throughout military nature, the appeal for support being based on the participation of Indian troops in the present war on the side of the British Empire. On entering the hall the speaker was met by a group of Christian girls from the home one of the women engaged in the struggle in her native country. The chair was occupied by Miss C. Raymond, who discharged duties of that office in his usual capable manner.

During the early stages of the war the portraits of several rajahs were shown, who had given their possessions to aid in the fighting on the war. Following showing of these slides were displayed the methods adopted by the classes to do their "bit" for the cause of justice. A few weeks the outbreak of the war, thousands of Indian troops were on the battle front, and out of a total of seven hundred princes, two died had offered their services to the king. Views of the various classes of men serving in the army from were shown and judging from the pictures they were of an exceptional type of men. In the early months of the war two hundred Indian soldiers had decorated for gallant service in war.
