Indo-Chinese Troops Fight

Paris, Jan. 15.—The war office communication to-day concerning the Macedonian front is as follows: "Bad weather has resulted in many floods and violent snow storms are recorded from the region of Lake Presba. The enemy has shown activity along the front held by the Italians, where an attack has been repulsed and prisoners have been taken; the Vardar positions have been violently bombarded in the region of Rapash; our artillery responded with energy. A depot of munitions has been destroyed at Futures, to the north of Skopje. There have been several encounters to the south of Lake Ohrida, particularly at Veliterna, where one of our Indo-Chinese detachments was engaged. Another detachment has made a slight advance in front of Zvezda."

Minnesota Sunk in Collision

By Courier Leased Wire. London, Jan. 15.—Lloyd's announces that the Steamship Minnesota has sunk while at dock, after a collision. Maritime records give three Steamships Minnesota, one American, one British and one Norwegian. The largest is the American liner of that name, owned by the Great Northern Steamship Company of New York, a vessel of 20,718 tons gross. She was damaged by fire in the Pacific late in 1915 and was taken to San Francisco for repairs. It was reported she had been sold to the British Government for use as a transport.
