One of the best known and most respected citizens of King's county, John S. Woodworth died suddenly at Berwick on Thursday evasing. Mr. Woodworth had been ill for some weeks, but nune of his family or friends were expecting his sudden de mise. Born in Cornwalls in 1882, son of Benjamin Woodworth.—John S. settled in Berwick in 1856, and from then till the present day has been prominent in the public life of the country; male a justice of the prace, he sat in the late summed Chipman, Dr. Hamilton, T. L. Dodge, and others, whose names are still honored among us. As a member of the action board, Mr Woodworth, has for years, advanced the educational interests of this county. As a public land surveyor, his chain and compass are familiar in every district of the county, and he knew more about its lines and boundaries than any man now living. A life-long conservative, yet he put men before methods, and desired good government rather than party advancement. As a lover-of peace and a man of good judgment, his sound advice has tendered to settle many disputes. Mr. Woodworth was married in 1855 to Elizabeth Corbett, who still survives. William H., is the only son of the deceased; two daughters having died some years hence.—Halifax Herald 5th.
