Washington, June 17.-In an interview to-day ex-Queen Liliuokalani said of the proposed treaty between the Unit-ed States and Hawaii: "Fifteen hundred people are giving away my country. The people of hay country do not want to be annexed to the United States. Nor do the people of the United States want annexation. It is the work of 1500 people, mostly Americans, who have settled in Hawaii. Of this number those who are not native-born Americans are of American parentage.
