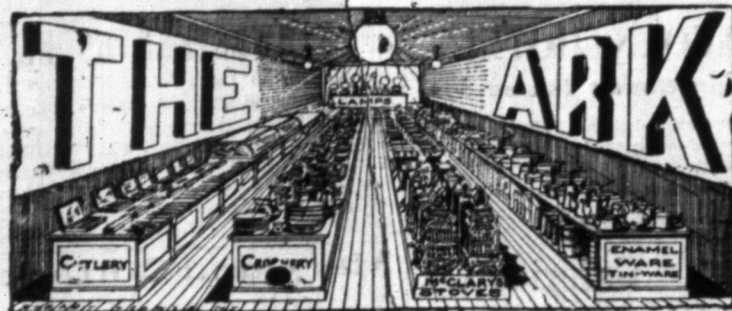

## PROF. KOCH'S ANNOUNCEMENT NOT GENERALLY ASSENTED TO

Evidence of Contagion Through Milk Overwhelming in Lord Lister's Opinion—Delegates Received by King.

London, July 26.—The Daily Mail publishes an interview with Lord Lister, in the course of which he is represented as having said he was absolutely unable to believe the statement of Prof. Koch that human beings could not get consumption through drinking the milk of diseased cows, the evidence to the contrary being far too overwhelming.

Sir William Broadbent declined to say how far Prof. Koch's statement might be correct, in view of the fact that tuberculosis, while generally decreasing, was on the increase among children.

Dr. Edward Neumann, of Davos-Platz, one of the Swiss delegates, said Prof. Koch was already prepared to meet the objections of Lord Lister.

In the House of Commons to-day, Rt. Hon. Walter Long, President of the Local Government Board, and formerly President of the Board of Agriculture said the views of Prof. Koch relative to human non-infection from tuberculosis cattle did not meet with the assent of the general body of scientific men. He added that the government will not take any steps in the matter.

RECEIVED BY THE KING.  
King Edward received the foreign delegates to the tuberculosis conference at Marlborough House yesterday. The delegates were accompanied by the Earl of Derby. Sir William Henry Broadbent, who was physician-extraordinary to the late Queen, and others. The King shook hands with each of the delegates, and spoke briefly. He expressed the hope that good results would come from their discussions.

## THE HERO OF MAFEKING WELCOMED IN ENGLAND

Enthusiastic Reception to General Baden-Powell—British Wounded Shot Dead by Boers While Binding Wounds.

Southampton, July 26.—Gen. Baden-Powell arrived here this afternoon. He was formally welcomed by the Mayor and civil authorities of Southampton, at the pier head. He boarded a train for London amid a scene of intense enthusiasm.

"PRESIDENT" KRUGER.  
Berlin, July 26.—The official North German Gazette announces that on the death of Mrs. Kruger, July 20, Count von Buelow, the Imperial Chancellor, conveyed his cordial sympathy to "President" Kruger through the German minister at The Hague. To this message Kruger replied, expressing his hearty thanks, through Dr. Leyds, representative of the Boer republics.

BOER TACTICS.  
London, July 27.—The Daily Mail publishes Lord Kitchener's official report regarding the Vlakfontein affair.

which is as follows:—  
"Lieut. W. S. B. Duff gives me the following:—  
"On the day after the fight at Vlakfontein, May 29, Lieut. Hearn told me that while lying on the ground wounded, he saw about 20 yards from him Lieut. Spring and Sergt. Findlay, both slightly wounded. They were binding up each other's wounds, when a young Boer with a pink pug-nose around his hat came and shot both dead. Lieut. Hearn lay quite still. The Boers, thinking him dead, contented themselves with taking his pulse and legs. Lieut. Hearn also said that others who were wounded were shot by Boers. Lieut. Duff collected this testimony of eight privates and non-commissioned officers who affirmed that they saw Boers about our wounded."

"Several of the men saw a Boer, evidently some one in authority, trying to stop his men from shooting our wounded."  
The foregoing is taken from Lord Kitchener's first mail report on the subject. He has wired that he would supplement it by sworn testimony.

## THE FIGURES BEAT THEM

There were Several Hoodoo Numbers but the Most Distasteful Were 5 and 0.

Lacrosse Club Badly Beaten in Blenheim in a Good Game—Referee McNab a Disciplinarian.

The Chatham Lacrosse Club played in Blenheim yesterday and were defeated by a score of 5 to 0. The only explanation that the Chatham boys can give for their defeat is that they were "hoodooed." The Chatham aggregation were 26 in number, they left Chatham on Friday, the 26th of July, when they got to Blenheim they were assigned to room 13 in the hotel, and the number of their players in the match, including the field captain, was 13. Under these contrary conditions it was no wonder that the Chatham boys were defeated.

The game, however, was not so one-sided as the score would indicate. The Chatham boys put up a hard fight and every member of the team worked well. Their one point of weakness, however, was, as in the other game, their lack of combination. For the first half Newman played in his accustomed place, in goal, but during this half the Blenheim boys gave us two clear shots which it was utterly impossible for Charlie to stop. During the second half Hull was put in goal and Newman played point. During this half the Blenheim boys scored three goals with the utmost ease. Elliott, Jahnke, and Wilson did the most of the star playing for Chatham and if it had not been for the hard work of these three players the score would undoubtedly have been much larger than it was. It was impossible for them, however, to fight against such an aggregation as Blenheim, who seemed to be all over the field at the same time. Every time the ball was thrown in the air it was invariably caught by a Blenheim player, who lost no time in passing it to one of his partners, who in his turn passed it on and on until one of them had a chance to shoot. Williston, at centre, is another Chatham player who deserves a certain amount of credit, and Poole, for a beginner, did well.

The work of the Chatham team was mostly on the defensive, the Blenheimites taking good advantage of their knowledge of the grounds, which are

far inferior to the grounds here. The Blenheim team worked well and worked together. It is almost impossible to select those who did the best as they are all fast players. Each man understands his fellow, and this, combined with the fact that they are all excellent stick handlers, accounts for their victory. Of course Knight and Shillington are the life of the team and are evidently the favorites with the Blenheim rowers. Burke is another "old-timer" and, judging from his playing yesterday, he has forgotten none of his old tactics. Stevenson, who did not play in the match here, was in his place yesterday, and also added materially to the strength of the team. Gibson, played centre and did remarkably well. Hewitt also played a very even game. Gray is a prominent man on the Blenheim home. He made some fine shots and did the most of the scoring. The game was a very even one decidedly interesting to the spectators. It was free from any quarrelling or disputing and everything passed off smoothly and well. There was not much "slugging." McNab, who refereed the game to everyone's satisfaction, was very firm in this particular. "We are going to have a clean game of lacrosse," said he, "and if I see a man wrongfully fouled, I will give him the benefit of it." And he kept his word. The Chatham boys have no reason to complain of the way they were treated by the Blenheim boys and everyone voted the Blenheim crowd to be jolly good fellows.

## KING'S TITLE

His Majesty's "Dominions Beyond the Seas" Will Be Fittingly Recognized.

London, July 26.—In the House of Lords to-day, Lord Salisbury, the Premier, introduced a bill authorizing King Edward to assume by proclamation within six months of the adoption of the bill, such title as he may think fittingly recognize his dominions beyond the seas.

The Premier added that this title would probably be as follows: Edward the Seventh, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions Beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith and Emperor of India.

## THAT HOODOO

Once Again R. L. Gosnell, of Blenheim, Goes Down in the Fateful Semi-Finals.

London, July 27.—The "hoodoo" in whose companionship R. L. Gosnell, of Blenheim, has struggled through the bowling tournament, haunted him again to-day. Three times previously the skillful western skip has met defeat in the semi-finals of the various competitions. To-day the same fate was his in the singles contest, when in the semi-finals J. McDougall, London, secured the narrow but decisive majority of one point. G. J. Gibb, also of Blenheim, made an excellent showing in the novice singles, defeating Moore, St. Thomas, and Smoke, Paris, ere he met defeat from his own townsman, Essnell.
