It is said that he has been able to operate the keyboard of a typewriter at a distance without any visible connec-tion between it and the instrument at hand. It is added that he has also discovered a new kind of ticken at hand. It is added that he has also discovered a new kind of "electric wave" whose existence has been suspected, but which has never until now been revealed. According to a Copenhagen despatch, the man made use of this mysterious agency to produce the reported result.

Paulsen, who is an ingenious and

reputable inventor, is best known as the author of apparatus for record-ing a telephone message automatical-ly when the person for whom the latby when the person for whom the latter is designed is away. The device is a form of phonograph and in certain respects is materially different from the Edison instrument. There seems to be no doubt as to the efficiency of the mechanism, but as yet it has not been introduced into service.

Several inventor have shown how to control the steerage apparatus of a submarine toricdo from the land or a ship without a wire. The system has not yet been adopted by any navy in the world. The demonstratiors thus far given have been made with models and for exhibition purwith models and for exhibition purposes only. From these it seems probable that certain simple mechanical operations like the moving of a tiny rudder can be directed from a distance. To manipulate thirty or forty keys either upon a typewriter or a linetype machine would be a much more difficult mechanical and electrical complications. Mrs. Donnelly is the foremost native woman in New Zealand, and when the Prince and Princess of Wales made their tour she presented their Royal Highnesses with the gifts they received from the natives. She also acted as cicerone throughout the Maoris' territory. During her stay in England Mrs. Donnelly was honored with many marks of favor by the King and

Friends of reform in Russia hope riends of reform in Russia hops that progress toward improved conditions among the poorer classes will be made under the new Minister of the Interior, General Prince Pierre Emitri Sviatopolk-Mirsky successor to the murdered Minister, Von Plehve, Von Plehve represented the forces of reaction and believed in the use of repressive and desurging many contractions. pressive and despotic methods. Prince Mirsky, on the other hand, stands for conciliation and an enlightened policy. He takes as his platform the Imperial manifesto of 1903, in which the Czar announced important ad-Czar announced important ad-

the Czar announced important ag-ministrative reforms.

Of this manifesto Prince Mirsky says: "It is a lofty, noble concep-tion of liberty. Conscience and decentralization are its basic principles. If interpreted in a liberal spirit we should have tranquility, progress and development in the interior of Russia."

The appointment of a man of Prince Mirsky's liberal ideas to the post of Minister of the Interior is regarded by many as the most important event of recent years for the suffering masses, whose progress is impeded by so many almost insuper-able obstacles. The new Minister an-

nounces that he will avoid ultra advances that he will avoid ultra radicalism as well as ultra conservatism and that, although it will be his aim to ameliorate the condition of the-lower classes, the people must be patient, for everything cannot be accomplished in a day. He declares his belief in local self-government as represented in the zemstyos. represented in the zemstvos.

As Minister of the Interior he will

have much to do with the Jews, and he is quite popular with that class of the Czar's subjects. He is fortyseven years of age and belongs to one of the oldest families of Russia, which traces its descent from Rurik, who founded the Russian monarchy. The rise of Prince Mirsky has been rapid and has been based on meri torious service. He gained distinc-tion in the Russo-Turkish war and rose through the lower grades of the army to that of major-general. He was appointed Governor of the Pro-vince of Penza in 1895 and later was transferred to the Province of Ekateranoslav. He proved so successful as an administrator that in 1900 he was made Assistant Minister of the Interior. His services in this capa-city led to his being raised to the high rank of lieutenant-general. was during the early part of the ad-ministration of Von Plehve as Minis-ter of the Interior that Prince Mirsky was made Governor of Vilna. In all three of the provinces he has administered his conciliatory pol-icy has rendered him popular with the poorer classes.
