An Anniversary.

On Wednesday evening at the Baptist church an interesting meeting was held for the purpose of suitably celebrating the 86th birthday of a most highly esteemed member, Rev. M. P. Freeman. The Sunday-school room was well filled and the whole affair passed off most pleasantly. Mrs. Young, president of the Social Society of the church, presided and gave a short address of welcome.

A short program including vocal solos by Misses Marie Wilson, Hon. C. Curry and Prescott, readings by Mrs. Ford and Miss Smallman, and a piano and violin duet by the Misses De Wolfe, was much enjoyed.

Addresses were given by Rev. Dr. Coburn, Rev. Mr. Martell, Mr. C. A. Patrinquin, Rev. Noble Crandall and Dr. Chute, all of whom have been intimately associated with Rev. Mr. Freeman in church work.

At the close of his very felicitous remarks Dr. Chute, on behalf of numerous friends, presented Rev. Mr. Freeman with a purse of eighty-six dollars, a dollar to represent each year of his long and useful life. Rev. Mr. Freeman replied in a fitting and characteristic manner after which the company repaired to the dining-room where suitable refreshments were served and further addresses were given by Revs. Dixon, Watts and Miller, representing other churches of the town.

The whole affair was a most timely acknowledgement of the esteem in which Rev. Mr. Freeman is held in the community, and wherever he is known.

Public Exercises of Grade II

The public examination of Grade II of the Wolfville schools, under the efficient management of Miss Susan Bixby, passed off very successfully on Wednesday afternoon of this week.

A goodly number of parents and friends were present. The exercises were varied and of an interesting character, consisting of songs, recitations, reading, spelling, arithmetic, nature, etc. The recitations were exceedingly well rendered. One very attractive feature was the calligraphic exercises, when the pupils responded with promptness and accuracy, their gestures being in accord with the teacher's commands. Equally attractive were the number work and mental arithmetic questions, such rapid calculation and correct answers being wonderful in children so young. Two prizes of two dollars and a half each were given, one to Gladys Menealy, for most progress during the year and the other to Earl Godfrey, for diligence. Much credit is reflected upon teacher and pupils for the pleasing manner in which the program was carried out.

The Air Flight.

Wolfville people were much interested in the airplane flight made last week by Lieut. Stuart Graham, son of Mr. Elson Graham, of this town. It was the first long distance flight in Canada, accompanied by his wife and mechanic, Lieut. Graham left Halifax at 2:25 o'clock Thursday afternoon in his Curtiss airplane, and arrived at St. John at 4:35. It was expected that he would fly over Wolfville en route and every one was on the lookout for him. However, all were doomed to disappointment as he flew well over the Basin and the day was hazy. Lieut. Graham resumed his flight Friday morning, but after getting 175 miles from St. John, an into a thunder storm and was compelled to land at Hagle Lake. Two more flights he reached his destination at Three Rivers, Quebec, on Sunday afternoon.

The Budget.

There are five outstanding features in the 1919 Budget.

1. The British preference is restored to its pre-war basis and the 7 1/2 per cent. extra war duties added to the general tariff in 1915 are removed from essential articles.

2. There is an average net reduction of about 4 per cent. in the pre-war duties on all agricultural implements.

3. The Canadian income tax is broadened and deepened to a point almost as severe as that which existed in Britain and the United States.

4. The business war profits tax, as severe as excess profits tax as was ever imposed in any country—is retained, this despite the fact that the British war profit tax has been reduced by Mr. Chamberlain to forty per cent.

5. The figures of projected necessary expenditure and of available revenue to meet it which reveal the seriousness of the financial situation.

As for the reductions (net) on agricultural implements, western law tariff men should have no complaint in regard to them; they are the precise reductions provided for under Mr. Fielding's reciprocity act. Sir Thomas White having apparently taken the famous 1911 proposals as his 1919 model.

The same thing can be said of wheat, wheat flour and potatoes; they are made free just as was provided for by reciprocity with the added step toward Cobdenism, however, that they are made free to us. In addition, moreover, there are other reductions from the pre-war tariff including the cutting of five cents a pound off the preferential intermediate and general rate on coffee, three cents on British grown tea and a substantial reduction on soda ash.

Taken all in all the loss of revenue resulting from these tariff reductions is estimated (with a reduced purchasing power considered) at twenty-five million dollars, a very considerable amount considering the gap to be bridged between contracted expenditures and visible revenue to meet it.

To make up this loss Sir Thomas White has had recourse to lines of action. He has deepened income taxation and he has—quite unexpectedly—retained the excess war profits tax. Under the new income taxation, corporations are to pay ten per cent. on all income in excess of two thousand dollars, dividends of shareholders being given credit for this in the normal tax they have to pay. Unmarried persons are to pay four per cent. on incomes from one to six thousand and married persons must pay the same from two to six thousand. A surtax will commence at five thousand instead of at six thousand as under the old tax, and the percentage of income taken increases with the size.

Canada's debt, when expenditures authorized for the current year are added, will amount to \$1,000,000,000 of \$225 per capita for 1919. When announced, the interest burden will be \$175,000,000 a year, he said, the expenditure being exclusive of pensions amounting to 35,000,000 or 45,000,000 annually.

Because of a disagreement over the bill proposals, Hon. T. A. Cressat has resigned as Minister of Agriculture. His resignation has been accepted by Sir Robert Borden.

The new Parliament buildings at Ottawa, it is said, will cost in the vicinity of eight million dollars, instead of five million dollars estimated before the advance in wages and increased cost in material.

The conviction for drunkenness in Canada has decreased from 63,975 in 1913 to 27,382 in 1918—a decrease of 54.27 per cent. in five years.

The Olympic sailed from Liverpool for Halifax on June 7. There are 5,200 troops aboard with some 330 for Halifax.
