Funeral Of Mrs. Alice Heninger

The Tabernacle was beautifully draped in white and there was a profusion of flowers covering the casket on Wednesday, as the funeral services began at 3 p. m. with Bp. C. W. Burt in charge. The choir of the First Ward had almost a full membership present and Mr. S. S. Newton was wielding the baton, beginning the services with that comforting hymn "Though Deepening Trials Throng Your Way." Prayer was offered by Mr. S. Williams, of the Stake Presidency. "Sometime We'll Understand" was the second hymn.

Edgar Jno. Taylor, Heavener of Magrath, uncle of our bereaved townsman, Mr. Ellis A. Heninger was the opening speaker, dwelling on the pre-existent state, our moral experience, and adding his testimony. Mr. Phillip Hornberger of the Orton Bishopric followed—he deceased being originally from this ward.

Mrs. Lexie Burton and Miss Eda Olsen sang the duet with much feeling "There is Hope Beyond the Veil," one of the favorite songs of the deceased who, with Mrs. Burton had frequently sung it.

President Thos. Duce, Messrs. Jno. S. Smith and Z. W. Jacobs were the speakers who followed in order.

By request of Mrs. Wood, mother of the deceased now lying very ill at Orton, the Choir sang "O My Father."

Pres. Edw. J. Wood referred to the first acquaintance at Stavelly with the family of Bro. and Sister Heninger, parents of the bereaved husband, some 16 years ago, and how the Pine Coulee Ward had grown from the time of their kindly welcome; of the missions of their sons, Jno. T. and Ellis, and the kindly care of their daughter Edith, Mrs. Simondson, for the deceased's children; of the beautiful life of the young couple, Ellis and Alice; of the deceased's last illness, operation, how kindly the nurses had been, and how she seemed to feel that her end was approaching after the visit of Death's messenger. He encouraged all to faithfulness and hope for the future life.

Bp. C. W. Burt made the closing remarks thanking all who had so kindly assisted in every way these last sad days.

The choir sang "When first the Glorious Light of Truth" and Elder N. W. Tanner offered the closing prayer. Interment was in the Cardston cemetery. The pall bearers were: Messrs. Geo. Sillito and Jas. Wood (brothers of the deceased) from Orton; Messrs. Jno. and Perry Heninger (brothers of the bereaved husband) and Messrs. Jno. S. Smith and J. Y. Card. Besides those named above there were Mr. Jos. Sillito, Mr. and Mrs. Hornberger, Mrs. McMurray and Mrs. Cooper from Orton, and Mr. and Mrs. Simondson from Calgary. Mr. Jno. T. Heninger and Mr. and Mrs. Ellis Heninger from Magrath while Mr. and Mrs. H. P. Heninger came from Grant's Pass, Oregon, to attend the funeral of their daughter-in-law.

Minister Of Education Pays Cardston A Visit

The gathering of Cardston citizens who attended the meeting called Tuesday evening by our local member of the Provincial Parliament, Mr. Woolf, were very much gratified by hearing the Honorable Minister, Mr. Geo. P. Smith, discuss the educational questions confronting Alberta.

After brief introductory remarks by Martin Woolf, M. P. P., Mr. C. W. Burt, Chairman of the

School Board, and Mayor Mark Spencer, as well as three musical numbers—a Solo by Miss Ruby Parrish, a Quartette by the Misses Eda and Vivian Olsen, Messrs. Walter Olsen and Jno. S. Smith, and a charming Piano Duett by Mrs. Layton and Miss Alma Coombs, the Minister of Education gave a lucid account of the many branches of work now coming under the care of the Department of

Education with the 4,000 school districts now erected.

The problems of development confronting the Government, railroads in the North, Irrigation in the South, Rural and Urban schools, Teachers and their difficulties, School Consolidations, Helps to the High Schools by increased grants, Teachers residences, educating foreigners, Rural High Schools for work in Grades

VIII, IX and X, and our financial difficulties consequent upon our growth as a Province, were all dwelt upon.

Mr. Martin Woolf closed with a forceful speech suggesting a better way of financing our whole Provincial School System. We shall refer to this phase of the meeting in a future issue. That the whole list of ratepayers were not present is the only thing to be regretted.
