London, May 1 .- Gavrio Prinzip, he assassion of Archduke Francis Ferdinand, heir-apparent to the Austro-Hungarian throne, and his wife at Sarajevo, Bosnia, died of uberculosis yesterday in a fortress lear Prague, the correspondent at The Hague of the Exchange Telegraph Company says.

Prinzip shot to death the Austrian archduke and his wife while they were on a visit to the Bosnian capital on June 28, 1914, and on the basis of this double murder the German Government plunged the world into war. Prinzip, who was student, was found guilty and sentenced to twenty years' imprison-
