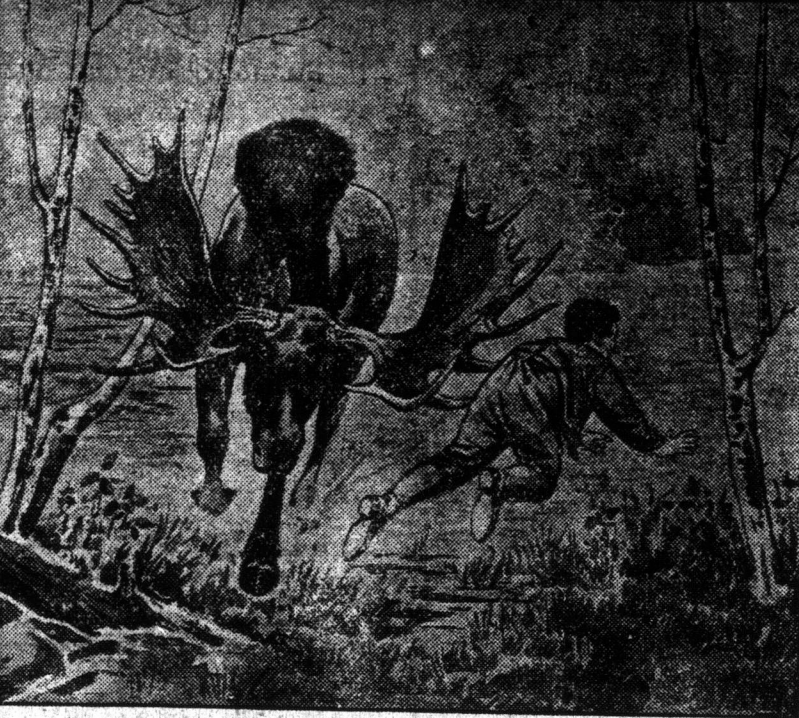

GAVRIO PRINZIP DIED IN PRISON

Man Who Killed Austrian Archduke Francis Ferdinand Succumbed in Fortress.

London, May 1.—Gavrio Princip, the assassin of Archduke Francis Ferdinand, heir-apparent to the Austro-Hungarian throne, and his wife at Sarajevo, Bosnia, died of tuberculosis yesterday in a fortress near Prague, the correspondent at The Hague of the Exchange Telegraph Company says.

Prinzip shot to death the Austrian archduke and his wife while they were on a visit to the Bosnian capital on June 28, 1914, and on the basis of this double murder the German Government plunged the world into war. Prinzip, who was a student, was found guilty and sentenced to twenty years' imprisonment.

Earlier in the day on which Premier Archduke Francis Ferdinand was shot, Medajo Gabrinovic, a tylist of Serbian nationality, had thrown a bomb which the Archduke warded off with his arm so that it exploded some distance from his automobile. The bomb injured six persons. Gabrinovic was sentenced to twenty years' imprisonment. Four other conspirators were sentenced to death by hanging, one to life imprisonment and one to twenty years in jail.
