## 132nd Battalion Fast Filling Up

Others on rising and in opening his remarks he said that wherever he goes there is pure or less talk against him after he has departed. The same thing had happened here when he was here nine months ago. Some people had taken exception to some remarks he had made. Every town has its gas bags, he said, and therefore he did not care what opinion people had of him. He spoke the truth and the only opinion he cared for was that which God had of him, because, he said, God's opinion of man cannot be wrong—God knows no lie, and he hates a liar.

Although some people found fault with his work, he had, however, the credit of bringing in more recruits than any other man in Canada, a record of which he was proud. Sgt. Knight said he was called the hammer—he hammers it in, in speaking about conditions as are existing today in the trenches, he would call upon his friend and brother—Private O'Toole, of Nelson, who had a seat on the platform if he was not telling the truth. He would ask him what suffering and death meant. He, too, had suffered and seen death. Death in the trenches fighting for freedom and honor was a glorious death. He would rather have his bones in Europe to bleach than return home and be no good.

Sgt. Knight said there were three classes of men in the world today—the shirkers, the jerkers and the workers. Men shirk because they have things too much their own way. He was the same way until he enlisted, and it took the trenches to shake him out of himself. We are too selfish—not cowards, but do not want to give up an easy life for a harder one.

The jerkers will say to you, yes, go and enlist, there's a good day's pay, and then when the time for sailing comes, all you have to do is to eat half a cake of soap and the doctor will declare you have a weak heart all right.

The workers—God bless them!—said Sgt. Knight. They think the matter over seriously and count the cost. They are the ones who accomplish a purpose. They are the ones who are needed today—those who are willing and anxious to work for the Empire's cause.

Sgt. Knight told the story of an interview held with a high German official, who said that religion was only for the weak, and the army was the place for the strong. To this remark the German official was asked about the women. Sheerly, he said, "Oh, they're only for the recreation of the soldiers." Turning to the young men Sgt. Knight asked them if they would like to see their mothers and sisters used for the recreation of those German brutes. New Brunswick, he said, is awaiting their answer. Our fathers would not have brought this country out of the wilderness if they had not had the backbone. We now have our country. We must also have confidence in the Mother Country. The boy who cuts off his confidence from his mother, he is lost one of the best things he ever possessed. If Canada cuts off her confidence from the Mother Country, there will be danger. The one essential thing to know is, what are the young men going to do about it. With men enough the war can be ended next year. It is a fact that the married men were the first to enlist, and quite naturally so, for the reason that their whole life is spent in sacrifice and in aiding others. A married man's one thought is the protection of his home and family, and therefore when the call to arms was sounded, led by instinct, he was the first to answer.
