



Lieutenant J. Dunton Sharman, who saw five years of active service with the Canadian army in the Great War, and whose brilliant extem poraneous addresses at club lunch-eons this winter are so well remembered, tells an amusing story of his experience at the time of his enlistment as a private in 1914. To use

"I knew the Commanding Officer of the first Canadian fighting regi-ment to be organized and he gladly accepted my offer of service. "I kept out of sight for two days and took my first long breath after the great convoy of ships was well out from the coast of Canada.
