



### Have Murder Ev The Throat

Mr. David Lloyd George in his address at the Lord Mayor's banquet at the Guildhall, discussed briefly which the Government is dealing.

With regard to Germany he declar ed himse t personally pleased with the proposals of that country for the liquidation of her obligations. Coincidentally the Chancelior of the Ex-cilequer Austen Chamberlain, an-nounced in the Houss of Commons that Germany had placed a large amount of bonds in the Lands of the reparations commission.

The Premier spoke optimistically of Ireland, intimating that the situa-tion there was well in hand.

Referring to questions between Germany and the All'es Mr. Lloyd George said that the real test of German sincerity was disarmanent, and he added "the report I have to give on that subject is very satisfactory.

"The German army is rapidly being reduced to 100,000. There are stil too many, rifles at large in Germany, but they are a greater menace to Germany's internal peace than to Germany's neigh' o. s.

Another impor ant point, said the Premier, was regarations, Germany is prepared to submit certain pro rosals for the liquidation for her obligatio. s," he continued, ',and peronally I am pleased with t.em They will be considered at the con-ferences and it is satisfactory to note that Germany realizes that her first duty is to repair the devastation the derman armies wrought.

,'I wish I could speak as hopefully of the Russian problem where we have to do with men professing the diculous, crazy creed of Bolshev sm who unfortunately fail to realize how important it is they should respect heir obligations.

He referred brie ly to the industrial situation and the recent coal strike expressing the belief that there is better temper now all around.

#### Sugar Now 13 Cents

As a result the selling price of granulated sugar was jammed down to 13 cents net to wholesalers. A further result of the fight was that Hudon, Hebert and Co, one of the largest wholesalers, reduced its selling price to retailers to 13 cents. Among the retailers the rice was variable in quantity, running from 14 cents to 15, 16, 17 and even in some cases 15 cents, but the general price 16 and 17 cents a lb. United States sugar is now undersold in the Canadian market since it cannot be laid down here to the retailer under 15 cents a pound, after paying archange, freight and duty. Hudon, Hebert and Co, are now underselling the Domin'on Sugar Company which out their price to \$13.50 less five per cent, to whole selers, whist the above firm are telling at 13 cents flat to retailer.
